## The Meeting House News

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### *REVeries*

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Ash Wednesday is March 1 and it marks the beginning of the Christian season of Lent, leading to Easter. I have known Lent ever since I was a little boy growing up in a largely Roman Catholic town, and though my family was white-bread Protestant, we fell into the culture of it all, if not with the dark smudge on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday, then with the notion of giving up something for Lent and inevitably eating fish sticks on Friday. Unitarian minister Barbara Rohde says she remembers the same, giving up, she says, “liver, Brussels sprouts, and spelling tests,” and though she is joking, she is coming close to the truth that some kinds of self-denial can become self-righteousness in the blink of an eye.

Here at First Parish, we covenant together to go deeper into ourselves, deeper not surgically or even psychologically — but deeper spiritually, as in the matters of the spirit, of the soul, of the essence of those ultimate things. We covenant to go deeper, as in cutting away all those scars of past hurts that have obscured the purity with which we were born; “with a shining in your eyes like the sunlight,” we say at child dedications here. We covenant to go deeper, clear the obstructions away and let the light shine. We at First Parish covenant to go deeper spiritually: here in worship, walking in the labyrinth outside, on retreats, in groups together, small group ministry, short story discussion, Wright Tavern wonderings, meditation, prayer, singing in the choir, spending time teaching our children, daydreaming, walking, playing golf, gathering around the table with family. We do not pass you any instruction sheet on how it is you must “go deeper” here. There are no magical prayers. There is no one story. We find our scripture in many places. It is one of life’s big adventures, and there is no owner’s manual.

## FROM THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE



The First Parish Capital Campaign continues moving forward. Cochairs **Melissa Perdue Gallo** and **Don Dembsey** are forming committees, participating in a myriad of meetings, and organizing processes and procedures for this multi-year effort. They are meeting regularly with our ministers and capital campaign consultant, Molly Turlish.

Three committees are being formed: Building, Organ, Fundraising

- The Building committee will begin by prioritizing the deferred maintenance projects.
- The Organ committee's first task will be to create an Request For Proposals (RFP), which will be used to solicit at least three bids for the organ rebuilding.
- The Fundraising committee is beginning work on soliciting "leadership" donations, which will form the first phase of the fundraising efforts.

The "case statement" (a capital campaign brochure) is being drafted.

Our architect's (Robert Olson's) first task will be to study how to best improve handicapped accessibility.

### TRANSYLVANIA PARTNER CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE

Our partnership activities have never been more healthy or more active than they are right now. Here's a recap of recent and ongoing activities.

In February we sent \$2,675 from our Christmas Eve collections, via John Gibbons, the minister of First Parish in Bedford and member of the executive committee of the UUPPC. Also in February we wired \$21,545 to Székelykeresztúr. This includes \$15,045 from 69 families/individuals to support 64 high school and college students. Thanks to **Sue Beck** for leading this great effort and to **Ivan Kristoffy** for all his help. Also included was \$6,500 to help with flood relief, \$1,500 of which was raised by the youth group. Thanks to everyone for these wonderful efforts in support of our friends in Transylvania.

We're also getting ready for a number of visits and activities during the coming 18 months. **Beth Norton** and **Lillian Anderson** have formed a steering committee to coordinate the August 2007 choir trip. **Mary-Wren vanderWilden** and the Youth Group are planning a pilgrimage for July of 2007. **Valerie** and **Rachel Holt** and **Donna Peterson** are coordinating this Thanksgiving's visit by József & Anna Szombatfalvi and others from Keresztúr. Istvan Csaka (one of the Keresztúr youth we have enjoyed on our last two youth pilgrimages) will be coming here from July to September, sponsored by Dana and Kathy Booth of Carlisle; we're coordinating a varied program for him. Last, many of our youth and adults are in frequent contact with their friends and students in Keresztúr via e-mail and instant messaging. Response has been enthusiastic to — of all things, what might seem to be a real “downer”— the recent series on end-of-life issues, “The Rest of Your Life and Beyond.” Several people have asked if it will be offered again. We can’t offer the whole series again this spring, but **Sue Dobbie** has offered to repeat her session on “Five Wishes.” “Five Wishes” is a document we fill out to express how we wish to be cared for at the end of our life, especially if we cannot express our wishes at that time. It includes the equivalent of a healthcare proxy (naming the person who will make our care decisions if we can’t) and a living will (naming what kinds of care we want and do not want).

Sue’s “Five Wishes” workshop is currently being scheduled. Look for notice of it in the *Sunday News*. You may pick up a copy of “Five Wishes” documents from the Exchange Shelf in the office, whether or not you attend Sue’s workshop.

I am so very grateful to Sue, **Jenny Rankin** and **David Pohl**, for leading several sessions of “The Rest of Your Life.” Each brought his/her expertise in a particular area and engaged the group’s interest and attention, provoking lots of questions and discussion. I personally have gained a great deal from doing this series. I’ve learned much that I didn’t know — or of which I was previously vaguely aware — about end-of-life planning. And I’ve learned how very compelling this subject is for so many people, and how very much such educational opportunities are needed!

Have you filled out a Personal Information Form for the ministers’ file? There’s a new one. This form lets us list important information that may be needed in the event that we are seriously ill or die, including our wishes for disposition of our body and funeral or memorial service. It is completely confidential and used only by the ministers in the event it is needed. It has been updated to allow for important information not previously included. So if you have one on file, do ask the church office for the new blank form and fill it out. It is a good idea to update all end-of-life documents every few years anyway, as our desires may change. If you haven’t filled one out, please consider doing so, whatever your age or health status. It is not easy to contemplate the reality that our good health may leave us at any time, but the best time for contemplating our wishes about that is just when we are healthy and thinking well.

And by the way, “Rest of Your Life and Beyond” participants report that it was FUN to contemplate the shape of their lives to date, what they want to accomplish before they die, and how to go about making all that happen.

## MUSings

*For my village I am yearning*

*Someday there I'll be returning;*

*Tell the people in Romania*

*I'll come back to Transylvania.*

These are the final words of Bela Bartok's *Evening in Transylvania*, a piece that the Adult Choir sang earlier this year for our Partner Church Sunday. I have known this choral adaptation of Bartok's instrumental work for quite a while. But I had always found Benjamin Suchoff's English words to be a bit sentimental.



That is, until I went to Transylvania in 2002 on the Choir's Musical Pilgrimage. That trip opened up new vistas for me and for the 43 other pilgrims who traveled together to share music, food, fellowship and faith with UU brothers and sisters in our partner church in Székelykeresztúr. No one who experienced that pilgrimage can deny the deep connection we established with the people and land in the "U" of the Carpathian Mountains. Since that trip, two more delegations of youth have returned to Transylvania, and our relationship with these people on the other side of the world has flourished.

So now it is time for the choir to return. In August of 2007, the First Parish Adult Choir will make another musical pilgrimage to Transylvania. Our purpose will be to strengthen our connection to our Unitarian sisters and brothers in Transylvania, to deepen bonds of friendships that have already been established, to increase our understanding of the roots of our Unitarian faith, which began in Transylvania in the 16th century, and of course to share beautiful music with our international friends.

We are in the early phases of planning for this journey. You may be wondering, "Can I come along?" The answer is yes! Those who wish to go on the trip and sing in the pilgrimage choir will be asked to join the choir for the 2006-2007 season. Our pilgrimage repertoire will be drawn from pieces sung during the church year. There will also be space on the trip for nonsinging family members and friends (or "roadies," as we called them in 2002).

Look for more information about this trip in the coming months. If you have any questions about the 2007 Musical Pilgrimage to Transylvania, please feel free to ask me. I am looking forward to returning to the place and the people that welcomed us as family in 2002.

### SECOND ANNUAL CONFERENCE FOR MASSACHUSETTS CAMPAIGN FOR A U.S DEPARTMENT OF PEACE

The state campaign for a U.S. Department of Peace ([maDoP.org](http://maDoP.org)), launched at First Parish a year ago, will hold its second conference on Sunday, March 19, from 2:00 to 4:30 p.m. at First Parish in Arlington, 630 Mass. The Standing Committee (SC) met on February 13 with **Lou Fackert** in attendance for the Trustees. **Pat Everett, Charles Lowell** and **Helen Stewart** attended as visitors. The SC continues to work toward executing effective policy governance. 1) Our first goal is to have an Ends Statement (which should declare not only who we are but who we strive to be) that truly defines us as a congregation. Our benediction, which is known by all who attend Sunday services, seems to be a logical starting point. We are putting a lot of thought and time into this important process, as the Ends Statement is the starting point for the goals that we set for ourselves each church year. 2) Another important feature of policy governance is good communication, with a steady flow of information between the SC and the members of the congregation. In the past, the SC has relied on informal methods of staying in touch — chatting at coffee hour, being on other committees, etc. We are working on finding ways to have a more formalized approach that will ensure not only that the SC knows the thoughts of the parishioners, but also that the parishioners feel connected to and involved with the SC and the governance process. 3) An important job of the SC under policy governance is to constructively evaluate its own ability to meet its goals for the year and the staff's ability to meet its goals. Since a church is in many ways different from a corporation, and our ministers have a much more intimate relationship with their parishioners than a CEO has with his employees, this presents a special challenge.

Changing the way things are done is always difficult, but we are confident that First Parish will rise to the challenge. We are learning as we go along, and each year we are more confident. Policy governance allows all of us to have a vision for the future and to work together to achieve that vision. Please look for the members of the SC at coffee hour and talk to them about First Parish.

I'll never forget the first day we brought our newborn son home. We brought him inside, placed him in the cradle and then just stared at each other. "Now what?" It seems from that moment on, our lives have just accelerated. No longer was time something we could control. Instead, time has an agenda of its own. Our schedule has been driven by feedings, naps and diapers; then by nursery school, play dates and music class; later by elementary school, soccer, and piano lessons; and finally by sports teams, college tours, SAT test dates, and bio labs.

We can't slow down time, but we can pay attention to its passing. First Parish helps us do that through the RE program. I have heard several parents say how much they love teaching an age group their child has already passed. It brings back so many memories of that stage in their own child's life. At the same time, I have heard others say how much they enjoy teaching an age group a few years ahead of their own child. This glimpse into the future of their child's development is priceless. It helps give us perspective as parents, where we have been and where we are going.

Next year, when you volunteer for our RE program, you may be planning to volunteer in your own child's RE classroom. But you may want to consider choosing an age group you particularly enjoy, or a skill that brings your own passion to our RE program. This allows you to develop a relationship with other kids while, concurrently, your child develops a relationship with other adults in our community. Our kids are so fortunate to have such an amazing pool of capable, engaging and dedicated adults at First Parish. Thank you, all, for this important gift we give to each other.
