REVeries

William Sloane Coffin, of Yale Divinity School, of Riverside Church, of Doonesbury fame, preached a wonderful sermon years ago on burn out. "It used to be," he said, "that when people said, 'I feel burned out,' they were describing their personal exhaustion... But today 'burn-out' also describes a common condition to those who thought that on such issues as the environment, peace, poverty, and human rights they had built something solid on hard rock only to find out that the rock was sand. Burn-out is a common condition for those who think that points once proved should stay proved, that progress is an arrow, not a pendulum."

And then Coffin goes on to offer a remedy for this kind of burn-out, a remedy found in images of the church, he says, these words from a man who both told the truth and also rode a fast horse, mixing politics and religion every chance he got. "Who do you think you are?" he would ask his congregation. And "what do you want — lifetime membership in the Bystanders Association?" Remember who we are, he said, and now he is speaking from his own Judeo-Christian heritage. Who are we? "We are a pilgrim people who have decided never to arrive." Beware of politicians who always want to go back, he would say. "The Church at its best is always in an exodus. We are a pilgrim people, a people who have decided never to arrive, a people who live by hope, energized not only by what we already possess but by that which is promised."

We are a pilgrim people, but our definition of family who are on this pilgrimage with us has grown too small. And most of our politicians have a definition of family that is far too small. "What's in it for me?" they think we want answered. But where's the talk about children and the homeless and all those who have fallen between the cracks? Who is talking about justice? This pre-election talk is madness.

Do religion and politics mix? They had better. They had better very soon. Our faith matters in this dialogue. This responsibility does not rest alone with just Cardinal O'Malley. It does not belong to just Pat Robertson or his latest manifestation. We have a faith. We have a message. We are pilgrims. We are prophets. We have a vision of the promised land. We will need to take risks. James Baldwin said once that "any real change implies the breakup of the world as one has always known it, the loss of all that gave one an identity, the end of safety." We are called to be at the end of safety and to take care of our brothers and sisters as if they were our brothers and sisters, and our sons and daughters, and our mothers and fathers.

Money Matters

We are nine months into the fiscal year and at this point are trying to anticipate where we will end the year from a financial perspective. On the income side, we received \$46K in pledge income this month. This is significantly lower than last month. Please continue to make payments toward your pledge, as pledge income is an important component in determining if we will end the year with a balanced budget. We understand that sometimes there are circumstances that may prevent you from fulfilling your pledge. If this is the case, please let us know so we can plan accordingly.

On the expense side, YTD expenses through March represent 73 percent of our budgeted expenses for the year. We are working hard to stay within budget in some areas, but still expect year-end total expenses to be within budget.

The audit of our 2005 financials is complete. The audited financial statements include both financial information from the operations of First Parish and the endowments of the church, managed by the Trustees. Therefore, **Tim Jacoby, Lou Fackert, Pat Brinkman** and I met with the auditors to review the reports. No major problems were found by the auditors. Tim then presented the audited financials to the Standing Committee and received their approval.

MUSings

"Mozart, Mary and May." This alliterative trinity has been on my mind as I plan for our annual spring Music Sunday. This year marks the 250th anniversary of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's birth on January 27, 1756. In celebration, it seems that almost every musical institution in the world has scheduled Mozart's music into their seasons. Why not First Parish too?

The question of which Mozart masterpiece to present offered an embarrassment of riches. But as I thought of choral pieces that would be appropriate for a Sunday morning at First Parish, I was drawn not to the large,



majestic masses that Mozart wrote — or to his operas, but to the many short and exquisite motets for choir and orchestra that he wrote during his years as a church musician. These pieces are less frequently performed in concert venues because they are so short; and rarely performed in their original liturgical context because of the instrumental forces they require. But these musical gems contain all the charm, grace and spiritual depth that characterize Mozart's music.

I was particularly drawn to Mozart's settings of Marian devotional texts — those traditional liturgical texts addressed to Mary, the mother of Jesus. During his years at Salzburg, early in his career, Mozart set many of these texts for Sunday worship. Two of these settings, *Sancta Maria Mater Dei* K. 273 (1777) and *Regina Coeli*, K.276 (1779) will be part of our Music Sunday celebration on May 7. The *Sancta Maria* is addressed to Mary in her role as comforter and intermediary. The *Regina Coeli* celebrates the resurrection of her son: "Queen of Heaven, Rejoice, for he to whom you gave birth is risen, as he said!"

The third motet I have chosen is the famous *Ave Verum Corpus* K. 618, which was composed in June 1791, just six months before the composer's death. This profound Eucharistic hymn commemorating the sacrifice of Jesus only mentions Mary once — as the mother of this sacrificed body. But for me, it encompasses not only the sorrow of the crucifixion, but also the very personal sorrow of the woman who bore this man. I cannot sing or hear it without picturing Michelangelo's powerful Pieta, and its depiction of a bereft mother holding her murdered son.

Together, these three short pieces, I believe, create a musical portrait of this divine female figure and express three aspects of her life and her spiritual legacy in Mozart's sublime musical language.

As I researched these pieces and the history of devotion to Mary, I also learned that in the Catholic tradition and especially in the tradition of Marian devotion, May is considered to be "Mary's Month." Thus, we have a serendipitous conjunction of three "M" words: "Mozart, Mary and May." Eric and I and the choir look forward to sharing this music with you on May 7.

SOCIAL ACTION GRANTS 2006

Congratulations to the following organizations that were notified this month of the awarding of a grant from First Parish.

Concord Carlisle Restorative Circle received \$1000; Household Goods Recycling Ministry

received \$1000;

Fundacion Para la Reconciliacion,

\$1,300; Partners in Health, \$3000; and

UU Urban Ministries received \$13,000 in grant funds to support Stand High Stand United, Renewal House, and Roxbury Youth Programs.

The Social Action Giving committee reviewed 16 worthy proposals, totaling \$42,000. Total funds available for immediate funding were \$20,000. Two proposals were forwarded to the Katrina Relief group for consideration, since these requests were to support victims of the hurricanes. Earlier this church year, Social Action Giving dedicated \$10,000 to support hurricane relief efforts.

Requests for funds far exceeded the committee's ability to provide financial assistance. In some instances, organizations received less funding than requested. If at the end of the church year the church receives the full amount pledged by parishioners, additional funding may be provided to these projects.

The Social Action Giving committee thanks all First Parish members for their continued financial support. The work of our church members and their commitment to social action through these and other organizations is a testament of the strength of our benediction — Go out into the world . . .

Standing Committee

The Standing Committee (SC) met on April 10, with **Don Dembsey** visiting and **Patrick Everett** observing. The Finance Subcommittee made several recommendations, which the SC endorsed, that address the future financial health of the church. Among them are ways to encourage more planned giving and ways to enable people to give money specifically earmarked for an endowment. Look for more information on planned giving in the coming months. One task of the SC under our governance policy is to evaluate its own role as a board, which we did by written survey, and the role of the senior minister as both minister and head of staff. The SC met with **Gary Smith** for over an hour in a closed session that enabled us to have a very open and constructive discussion with him about his work with the congregation, the staff and the board. At our next meeting, we will look at recommendations for future action that will come out of these evaluations. The SC has decided that there are certain issues that are best discussed without visitors present. The next meeting, on May 22 at 7:00, will be open to visitors for the first hour, after which the SC will meet in executive session.

THE SOUND OF SPRING

Can you hear it? In very early May on a very warm day I love to sit on a rock at the edge of the woods. I sit very still and if I listen, really listen, I can hear the sound of the new year's growth pushing up through the leaves. The first time I did this, it startled me. "What is that noise?" I thought. I still can't get that sound of spring out of my mind. Once you hear it you can never forget it.

I have heard others say this about other things — peepers in vernal pools, returning songbirds and the pungent smell of hyacinth in the air. Harbingers of spring — of rebirth, of new beginnings.

Take a moment to sit with your kids and listen. Ask them to name the sounds of spring. Children take it all in. They haven't learned to disregard this noise or that smell. Each sound, smell, sight is seen with fresh, untrained senses. Take advantage of these hidden talents in your own child.

Solicitors work in pairs. They schedule a face-to-face meeting with each potential donor. Sometimes, second meetings are held. It may seem like a time-consuming process, but we are committed to a professional approach.
