One of my favorite parts about being a minister is getting to listen to your stories. I hear them sitting with you in my office. I hear them at coffee hour or in the hallway or in the vestibule after worship. I hear them by your hospital bed or in your home. When I look out at your faces on Sunday, I remember the stories you have told me. Sometimes they are funny, sometimes they are sad, sometimes a bit of both. I always like to hear the story of how you came to First Parish in the first place and why you came back. What it is that makes you stay, what place this community holds in your life or the life of your family.

Each one of us has an individual story of our connection to this faith community. And if somehow, magically, we could pool all these stories together, they would make up our "collective spiritual autobiography." That is our story as a people of faith, right here, right now, at the beginning of 2007.

I've been thinking lately about the very beginning of our story as a people of faith, nearly 400 years ago. I want to ask our deacons to tell me the story again in their own words. The beginnings of our "collective spiritual autobiography" lie in a land that was wilderness and in the courage and tenacity of those first settlers.

I am thinking about our beginnings, I realize, because we are making some big strides into the future. We are raising money for our annual campaign in this season, and this spring we will begin to ask the general congregation for gifts to the capital campaign. These are opportunities for each one of us to give our financial support to strengthen this institution and take it to the next place in its story. We are making a big step out into the future, and for me, it helps to touch the strength of our roots. It helps me to remember the amazing grit of those women and men who started First Parish almost 400 years ago, and the generations ever since who have kept this place going and given it to us as a gift for us and our families. Touching that courage and grit gives me courage for this next stage of the journey.

We are a church on the move. I am heartened by news of how well the leadership gifts for the capital campaign are coming in. I am heartened by the superb leadership of the annual fundraising team this year. I am heartened that your generosity last year meant we went over our fundraising goal by thousands of dollars. I am grateful to those of you who are putting a stake in the ground to say, "Yes, this community matters to me. What we say here about truth, beauty, justice, that's what I want my children to hear. What we try to do here when we go out into the world in peace, that's the kind of service I want to give in my life. Yes, I'll be a part of making this place stronger because this place, First Parish, is doing some good things in a world that needs them so badly."

You reveal your personal connection to First Parish in your presence, in the talents you share, and in the financial gifts you give. Together, we are a church on the move. Taking First Parish into the next, new chapter of its story. Together, we are building that dream.

Dear Brothers and Sisters: Our visit in Concord, those fifteen days spent among your congregation became an endless source of beautiful memories for all of us. Words cannot express how grateful we are — when we say thanks to everybody, to all of you! I cannot forget the first dream I had at home: we were in Concord, walking together with you on the streets, entering each house, visiting all the families, and we were singing a song about how beautiful life is, about the miracle of love. Now, when Christmas is coming, we wish you to feel on Christmas Eve that you have lit a different candle than the other days — that the candle's light is different — that the Christmas tree's scent is different — that the words we/you tell to each other are different — that love is coming to you/us from an endless source, because your/our Brothers and Sisters are praying for you/for us. Today the whole world, the whole life is more beautiful, people are more beautiful, because they are remembering the happy days they have lived together. May this Christmas bring you joy and happiness, may this New Year make your dreams come true. Share our love with all the members of the Concord congregation.

Money Matters

December 31 marks not only the end of the calendar year, but the halfway point of our fiscal year at First Parish. It is therefore beneficial to take a look at where we are financially at this point in the year. As you know, pledge income makes up almost 75 percent of our budgeted income each year. As of December 31, we have received 62 percent of budgeted pledge income; this is consistent with last year. We are doing well on the expense side as well. Overall, our expenses are lower than budgeted at this point in the year. If you were to look at specific accounts, you would find that some are over budget and some are under budget so far this year. Fortunately, those that are over budget are timing issues or other things that are in our control. For example, when we learned of the large church conference, we spent more money on professional development earlier in the year than expected. This can be offset by managing expenses later in the year.

In other financial areas, it has been a busy time for both the annual pledge campaign, Pledge 2007, and the Capital Campaign. I have provided the pledge team with financial information to help you understand how our money is spent at First Parish. We hope this will be helpful to you in making your decision on how much you can contribute to the workings of the church this year. In January, Rob Richardson and David Hesel transferred the Capital Campaign funds to Cambridge Trust. Most of this money was put in a Certificate of Deposit in an effort to earn the highest interest possible; the remainder was put in a checking account to pay upcoming bills. We appreciate the pledges and contributions you are making to the Capital Campaign and will continue to monitor these finances to make sure we are getting the best return on our money.

Pastoral Care News

Appreciation Luncheon for Pastoral Care Volunteers

Volunteers, please give thought to the gifts you have received in your giving.

In her insightful and beautifully written book, *Just Like Life*, **Dana Snyder-Grant** asks, "Did you know that the United States military has a Directorate of Time?" As I thought about it, I realized most of us go through the day as if we were the "Directorate of Time" by creating long lists of "to do's." Of course, life happens and disrupts our lists. Dana, who has multiple sclerosis, writes that "living with chronic illness in this fast, busy culture" has required a letting go of the expectations of busyness that this culture promotes and values. Instead she appreciates the flow of time in "the simple things" — family, friends, relative health, and the time to smell the flowers.

David Steindl-Rast, a Benedictine monk, also writes about appreciating the flow of time. He explains the monastic understanding of time can also apply to everyday life. The word "hour," from the ancient Greek understanding, is not a numerical measure, but a soul measure. The hours are seasons of the day, and they were originally understood in a mythical way. "Earlier generations saw the hours personified, encountered them as messengers of eternity in the natural flow of time growing, blossoming, bearing fruit...therefore each hour was like a messenger from another dimension and had its own significance...Seasons are qualitative experiences: we sense a subtle difference in the quality of light, the length of daylight, the feel of the air on our skin." Even with our busy schedules, we can slow down to notice different character of each day. The word "season" comes from the Latin root "to sow." Steindl-Rast writes the "hours of a day are seeds we sow within ourselves and outside in the world. When we step out of clock time, to notice "the messengers of the hour," we can become part of the flow of time and enjoy the fullness of time in moments throughout the day.



This network of colleagues from congregations all over the United States and Canada is a valuable resource and support for me and the music ministry at First Parish.

I have been presiding during an exceptionally productive period in the UUMN's history. Our new



very successful children's songbook, *May This Light Shine*, in 2006. The organization voted to adopt its first Code of Professional Practice in 2005, and last summer the UUMN launched a professional certification program for UU musicians to parallel similar programs by LREDA, the association for UU religious educators, and the AUUA, the association for UU administrators. Since many of our music leaders (myself included) come to Unitarian Universalism from other denominations, this certification process is tremendously important in training musicians to work in our wonderful and unique tradition.

The year ahead promises more excitement for the UUMN: we have received a grant from the UU Funding program to finance a consultant to coach us as we restructure our governance system to serve our members more effectively and the congregations of the UUA. This all begins in February, when I will be attending UUMN Executive Committee meetings in Clearwater, Florida. (Did I mention there were some perks to this job?)

Working with my music colleagues on all these projects has been a tremendous education for me, and through it all I have had the opportunity to join in and lead some rewarding music making at General Assemblies, UUMN conferences and district events. My work with the wider denomination gives me a broader perspective on Unitarian Universalism and the respected role that First Parish in Concord plays as one of the UUA's "flagship" congregations.

It will be another busy year, but I'm hoping it will be a productive one for UUMN. It is a privilege to serve this organization and to be one of the faces of First Parish in the wider denomination.

REflections and RE News

The world seems to be changing so quickly. Ten years ago I'd ask, "Do you have an e-mail account?" Now it's just, "What's your address?" This technology surge is not just affecting us, but our kids. Our children are spending more and more time in virtual worlds and 3D games many of us don't understand. It is difficult to know how much is too much and where to set limits. And it is scary to think our kids enjoy these digital realms more than the real ones.

How will this affect our children, developmentally, socially and spiritually? No one can know for certain. I have difficulty grasping the draw of these games. I am grounded in the real world, in nature and in personal relationships. And I want this for my children, but it is hard to compete with the highly engaging and self-absorbing computer.

When we bring our children to our First Parish community, we are immersing them in a community that cares about each child's inner growth. Each Sunday, our kids meet real people doing important work in our world and for our world. We talk about things that are important: how to treat each other, how to take care of ourselves, how to nurture our spirits. This is one way we can ground our children in this world, the world without screens.

As parents, we do the best we can. We have good days and bad days with our children. Sometimes we look to each other for support and sometimes we feel we are on our own. But at the end of the day, we strive to give our kids the foundation they will need to find their way in life. At First Parish we hope to help you on this journey. We hope that some of this foundation is built here, on Sunday mornings, in the real world.
