# REVeries

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March is an unpredictable month, a transition month that brings us from winter to spring. It has all the bluster of February, yet holds within it the promise of the first day of spring. March can seem like a long and bleak month. This year the season of Lent occurs in March. Lent is the season of preparation for resurrection of the earth, represented by Jesus in the Christian tradition at Easter. It is a time for reflection on our life and preparation for future growth and rebirth.

When my daughters were small, we lived in Vancouver, British Columbia, the land of long, cold, rainy winters, and March came at the end of a very long gray season. The rainy period was endless, dragging on for six months, making it difficult to take the children outdoors for fresh air and physical exercise. With snowy winters, parents can bundle up the kids and go sledding, go skiing or ice skating. In the freezing rain, even with boots, slickers and umbrellas, playing outside was out of the question; it was just too cold.

One of the things we did to help with cabin fever, besides spending lots of time at the community pool for family swims, was a weekly dinner with two other families. Each of the five adults took turns cooking, and we rotated among the three houses. Our children looked forward to the dinners and a night out during the week. This is where Emily and Becca practiced and learned table manners, and how to have a conversation with others during mealtime. We laughed together, shared stories, and got a night off from cooking. These shared mealtimes are something my adult daughters still talk about today; they represent memories of our extended family in the Pacific Northwest.

In March, there are many events for families and individuals planned at First Parish to build memories, to share food, worship and ideas with other congregants. "Marvelous Mondays" happen every week, and begin with appetizers at 6 p.m. and dinner at 6:15 p.m., starting on March 5. Marvelous Mondays are a great opportunity for families to take a night off from cooking (there will be a small charge to cover expenses) and to enjoy the companionship and pleasure of dining with other First Parish members. Dinner will be followed by a short worship service called Vespers at 7:00 in the Chapel. Vespers services include songs and readings, and are family friendly. Afterward, Carl Scovel will join us to talk about the Gnostic Scriptures, from 7:30 to 9:00.

March can seem interminably long, but we can make the most of this wonderful congregation's energy and enthusiasm for community building to combat the month's dreariness. The ways we engage with one another over a shared meal, with worship, and by learning with one another builds the connections we need to feel alive and connected to that web of existence that connects us all.

I am grateful for the many ways we experience the richness of all that Life offers in this special community of First Parish. Participating in Marvelous Mondays is another way to mine this precious jewel and to enjoy the collective journey we call Life.

So, hopefully, see you on Monday!

### CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE: BUILDING A DREAM

**Reminder:** *Please periodically check the website to keep tabs on the fundraising total.* 

Building construction is now scheduled to begin in the spring of 2008. The delay provides more time for the staff to prepare for the transition and for the Building Committee to navigate the time-consuming public hearing process.



The Organ Committee has narrowed its list of potential organ contractors. But because the organ work hinges on the timing of the building construction, the Request for Proposals (RFP) will not be released until the timing of the organ work can be more closely estimated.

# Money Matters

We are more than half way through our fiscal year now and our budget picture continues to look positive. We have received 69 percent of our pledged income for the year, which is consistent with pledges received at this point last year. Pledge income is our biggest source of revenue, so these numbers are watched carefully to determine if we will come in on budget for the year. The other piece to a balanced budget, of course, is the expenses. We continually monitor expenses to make sure they will come in at or below budget. At this point in the year we have some expense accounts running over budget and others running below budget. Looking at year-end projections, there are a few accounts that may overrun by year-end, but these accounts will be compensated for by lower spending in other areas and additional income received through gifts.

As you know, the annual pledge campaign is in full swing. The committee has worked very hard, so please help them out by submitting your pledge before or at Celebration Sunday on March 4. The leaders of both the annual pledge campaign and the capital campaign have additional write-ups in this newsletter to keep you up to date.

# Pastoral Care News

Like peace, pastoral care also requires a soft, open heart and the full awareness of our essential interdependence, our fundamental need for one another. On February 4, the Pastoral Care Council (**Judy Dembsey, Pam Ressler, Jiffy Read**, **David Pohl, Ursula Kristoffy**) hosted an appreciation luncheon for the First Parish pastoral care volunteers, celebrating the many gifts of caring each brings to First Parish. There are over 50 volunteers who help to cook or bring a meal, provide transportation, visit, send notes and cards, welcome babies and more.

We are always looking for volunteers. Can you drive a parishioner in need to medical appointments in Concord? Call the church office and give them your name and number. Please remember if you have other commitments, you should feel free to say no. There are other volunteers to call. Do you like to cook? Two to three times a year **Rhoda Miller** and **Diane Bleday** (of Caring Connection) put out the call for kitchen helpers to be part of a cook-a-thon. Last month the call for kitchen helpers went out, and **Darien Smith**, **Jean Hill**, **Lois Suarez**, **Bev Bringle**, **Carolyn Shohet**, and **Jane Johnson** responded. Soups, hearty chicken meals, as well as vegetarian meals were cooked, packed, and put in the parish freezer. When there is a need, a church-cooked meal is delivered by **Bev Bringle**, **Pat Kane** or **John Muresianu**. The meals are often delivered in paper bags decorated by the children in RE. When you receive a meal from First Parish, you are truly receiving a meal from the whole parish.

"Our inescapable relatedness" means at one time or another, we all can volunteer by calling to say, "Do you know so-and-so (or a family member) is in the hospital, has had a loved one die, just lost his/her job, or is going through a divorce?" Many parishioners already do this, and it is a great help. Confidentiality is always respected; no one appears on the pastoral list for prayer time unless permission is given. But if you need help, don't wait for a fellow parishioner to notice; please call and ask. At First Parish we truly belief in "our fundamental need for one another," and we find ways to live it with an open heart.

# MUSings

"For my village I am yearning Someday there I'll be returning; Tell the people in Romania I'll come back to Transylvania"

Exactly a year ago, I began my *MUSings* with this same quote from Bela Bartok's *Evening in Transylvania*. At that time, the choir was just in the beginning stages of planning a return to Transylvania and our partner church in Székélykeresztúr. Now, a year later, over 40 people



have signed up for our August 2007 Musical Pilgrimage. In March 2006, I wrote about how I used to feel this was just a bit of sentimental verse and how my perspective had changed since my

first visit to Transylvania. Now, I am yearning to go back to Transylvania.

Since our last musical pilgrimage in 2002, our relationship with our partner congregation has deepened and our ties to our Transylvanian brothers and sisters in faith have strengthened. Our youth have created strong bonds with the youth of Székélykeresztúr and have helped immensely with work projects in that town. We were all able to share the joy of welcoming our Transylvanian guests when they were with us at Thanksgiving.

In 2002, on our first musical pilgrimage, we learned how music could quickly build a bridge between our disparate cultures and languages. I will never forget how moved I was when the youth of Székélykeresztúr greeted us with "Country Roads Take Me Home" and "O-bla-di, Obla-dah" when we arrived. Nor will I forget the tears in the eyes of our hosts when we sang "Esti Dal" and the Székély Anthem.

And now we are preparing for another reunion, one with music at its center. On Saturday, March 10, the Adult Choir and our special musical guest, jazz pianist Laszlo Gardony, will present a concert of American and Hungarian music as part of "An Evening in Transylvania." This event is our major fundraiser to help with the expenses of choir members who are going on this summer's pilgrimage. It will be an eclectic evening of choral and jazz music, dancing, and **Siri Smedvig**'s fabulous violin playing. I hope many of you will come to this concert and support the pilgrimage.

And there is space for a few more pilgrims (see note at left), so if you have been contemplating this trip, but thought it was too late to sign up, think again. Please contact me directly if you have any questions about the pilgrimage.

First Parish was also well represented. An Iraqi war veteran spoke to the gathering following the march. Janet Vaillant, together with GRAP steering committee members, organized the rally. Both Janet and **Al Armenti** served as rally leaders.

# REflections and RE News

Each time we finish a program in RE, we want to know what you and your child think about the program. Was it a worthwhile program? Did your child grow in some way? Were new friends made? Was it the right amount of time? To find out what you think, we send you a survey.

These surveys help our RE team shape our programs in a way that reflects the needs of parents and children at First Parish. We listen to what you have to say and modify programs in ways that we hope will improve them for your family.

In our Religious Education program, we are building curricula that reflect our own First Parish values. We are creating and gathering story baskets for Spirit Play. We are developing workshops for our 2nd-6th graders. We brought Young Activists to our 7th graders, allowing them to go out into the world and do something to help others. We are visiting a wide range of worship communities in Neighboring Faiths. Our Whole Lives (OWL) has been modified to include more information on the changing world of technology in our young teens' lives. We have adjusted our Coming of Age (COA) schedule in order to increase the number of retreats and reduce the number of meetings.

Many of these modifications are a direct result of observations and feedback from kids and parents in our RE programs. Some are minor changes that greatly improve these programs. Some are important changes that protect the health of our teens. Some are time changes that enable greater numbers of children and leaders to participate. We come from a long history of great RE programs at First Parish. But even great programs need modifications as communities change, as populations change, and as our world changes around us.

Our RE staff puts great effort into our programming for youth.
