In Paul Rasor's book, *Faith without Certainty*, he concludes, "Liberal theology is not for the faint of heart. It points us in a general direction without telling us the specific destination. It refuses to make our commitments for us but holds us accountable for the commitments we make. The liberal religion is an invitation, not a mandate. It invites us to live with ambiguity without giving in to facile compromise; to engage in dialogue without trying to control the conversation; to be open to change without accepting change too casually; to take commitment seriously but not blindly; and to be engaged in the culture without succumbing to the culture's values. Liberal religion calls us to strength without rigidity, conviction without ideology, openness without laziness. It asks us to pay attention. It is an eye-open faith, a faith without certainty."

At the beautiful Coming of Age Services on Sunday, May 20, the youth in their own words embraced the ambiguities of life and of liberal religion. One ingredient the youth agreed needed to be present for the development of their faith was the compassionate and loving presence of family, friends and this congregation. It is in the presence of love and acceptance that each one of us, no matter our age, can gain strength and courage, even when the outcomes are uncertain.

The same is true in Pastoral Care. The willingness to be with another in life's ambiguities, the willingness to engage in dialogue without dominating the conversation, the willingness to be present, to pay attention and to have compassionate curiosity brings its own kind of knowing — a knowing full of awe of the mystery of life and death, a knowing full of gratitude for the gifts of life.

Pastoral Care News

In her book titled Faith, Sharon Salzberg writes, "Faith is the ability to offer our heart to the truth of what is happening, to see our experience as the embodiment of life's mystery, the present expression of possibility, the conduit connecting us to a bigger reality." Salzberg also explains despair is the opposite of faith. "When we despair, our most visceral torment is that we feel separate from everyone and everything around us, alone and abandoned." Because all of us have experienced times of faith and times of despair, the pastoral care volunteers and the ministers at First Parish are here to be with you in the truth of what is happening and to let you know you are not alone, not abandoned - even at the darkest moments of life. There are many ways pastoral care volunteers weave this blanket of faith and compassion to hold us in community.

Today I would like to acknowledge several members who are retiring. Jiffy Read and David Pohl have bridged three ministers - Becky Blodgett, Karen Foley and me - sharing their wisdom and energy to develop the Pastoral Care Council and serving on it. I am happy to report David will continue as Pastoral Visitor. Rhoda Miller is stepping down after many years of excellence as Memorial Reception Coordinator, but is continuing as cochair of Caring Connection. As reception coordinator, Rhoda has offered a wonderful service to families at their time of grieving by insuring that after the memorial service, the caterer followed the family's wishes, and that the Parish Hall was welcoming to all. Diane Bleday, who has served with Rhoda as cochair of Caring Connection, will be stepping down. Diane and Rhoda have worked beautifully together, periodically recruiting kitchen helpers to prepare meals in First Parish's kitchen and storing them in the freezer so there are meals ready to be delivered when a parishioner is in need. Diane and her husband Michael are moving to Plymouth, Mass. We will miss them, but we wish them well. As was announced earlier in the year, Sandie and Tom Kennedy have retired from serving as cochairs for Holiday Flowers.

Standing Committee

The Standing Committee (SC) met on May 14, with Lisa Cole attending as a guest. Don Leopold, Sara Ballard and Rob Richardson were absent. We attended to a lot of end-of-year business, including our own self-evaluations, plans for the Annual Meeting (June 10 at 11:30 a.m.), head of staff evaluation, and plans for a meeting with Gary Smith in June to prepare for next year. The SC is also working on a sabbatical policy, an evaluation policy, revision of our Ends Statements, a method of setting goals for the year with the staff and strategic planning. Several SC members met with the Trustees, and we plan to initiate two meetings per year in order to improve communications. Jenny Rankin and Lisa Cole presented ways to help balance our projected budget for 2007 with the pledges that have come in. Currently, we are \$115,000 short of our goal and will need to make cuts to the current proposed budgets if more pledges do not come in by early June. The SC gave their input to Jenny's ideas for ways to balance the budget, and she will have the revised budget ready for the Annual Meeting. Jenny hopes to initiate a "think tank" in mid-June that will look at how we raise money at First Parish to see if we can develop a model that will better serve our needs.

We would like to urge everyone to attend the Annual Meeting on June 10. There will be a report from the Come Build a Dream campaign as well as the usual reports from the SC and committees. A light lunch will be available beforehand.

Money Matters

Financially, this is a busy time at First Parish. We are coming to the end of our fiscal year and planning for next year. The FY'07 financial picture looks good. We have received 90 percent of our budgeted subscription income, which is slightly higher than last year. Assuming our pledges come in as budgeted, we expect to end the year with a surplus. This is due to a number of factors, including some additional monetary gifts received by the church this year and higher than projected interest income.

Looking ahead to FY'08, the picture does not look as good. We have not reached our pledge goal for next year. This may mean making cuts in various program areas. It is hard to cut back on programs we know are so important to our congregation. If you are planning on pledging, but have not yet filled out your pledge form, it would be very helpful if you could do so in the next few days. Pledged income represents approximately threequarters of our budgeted income each year, so it is important to know our pledge income for next year in order to put together the budget. I am hopeful that any cuts will be minimized by the generous contributions of those families who have not yet pledged.

MUSings

I have written in this space before about my annual June "fileshifting ritual." As we head into summer each year, I move the file folder containing all the orders of service since September from an active file drawer to an archive. I then start a new folder in anticipation of the summer and fall. There is something



about marking the transition into summer with this simple administrative task each year and I try to notice it. As I write, it is still some weeks before I perform

that annual ritual. But I was reminded of it recently.

One afternoon, when I was browsing through this year's orders of service to look for a composer's name, I was startled at how the life of this congregation leapt out at me from that folder. Every page reminded me of traditions, transitions and milestones we have marked and celebrated with and for one another this year. As I turned the pages, I saw faces of friends and loved ones who had died this year, some tragically young and some at the end of long productive lives; I saw names of youth leading our Coming of Age and Ways of Worship services who had been dedicated not that many years ago; I saw children being dedicated who will be speaking their credos from our pulpit before we know it. There were music titles that vividly recalled for me a particular Sunday and season. There were sermon titles that reminded me of a valuable insight.

And I was struck by the variety in our worship from Sunday to Sunday. An observance of the Jewish High Holidays, of Divali, of Christmas, Passover and Easter. A service led by a percussionist; children's messages that made us catch our breath in anticipation — or laugh out loud. Songs and sermons and credos that made us weep. Silences that embraced those in need of our care and concern. In those few minutes of browsing I was drawn into the rhythm of our lives together as a congregation; swept up in the dance of the year and awed by the energy, variety, and depth of this community.

This was only one year in the long history of this remarkable congregation! We really are part of an "unbroken line" that moves "forward through the ages." Together we are traveling just one leg of the spiritual journey we covenant to make together.

It is easy to forget this when we are focused on the day-to-day demands and details of our life together. I was thankful for this opportunity to step back, get some perspective on the past year and appreciate the gift it is to be part of this congregation at this moment in time.

FAIR TRADE COFFEE

"I want to send my thanks to all of the congregations that purchase our coffee. Thanks to you, we have a seed of hope in our lives." —Jose Luis Castillo Vasquez, coffee farmer, El Salvador

Since Fair Trade coffee was formalized in 1988, the price paid to farmer cooperatives has been \$1.26/lb., plus 15¢ per lb. if the coffee was certified organic. Now the global Fair Trade community is raising the minimum prices paid to coffee farmer cooperatives. The new prices, effective June 1, will be \$1.31/lb., and \$1.51 for organic. Equal Exchange is raising the prices to \$1.36 for conventional, and \$1.56 for organic, coffee. WHY SHOULD YOU BUY THESE FAIR TRADE SNACKS?

Equal Exchange's roasted pecans are grown and shelled in southwest Georgia by the members of the Southern Alternatives Agricultural Co-op (SAAC), a co-operative of AfricanAmerican farmers and workers. A group of devoted women kept the operation alive for years when it was difficult to find a committed buyer for their products. Since Equal Exchange, SAAC and the Federation of Southern Cooperatives (FOSC) decided to build a partnership, over 300 congregations have ordered more than 2,000 pounds of pecans, almonds and cranberries from U.S. farmers! We are creating a more just, sustainable and democratic food system around the world and here in our own backyard.

REFLECTION FROM RE COUNCIL MEMBER Allison Aley

This church is blessed with so many talented and involved people and I have come to know many of them through my time serving on the Religious Education Council. URGENT NOTE: PLEDGE 2007 ANNUAL CAMPAIGN FACES SHORTFALL OF \$115,000.

We thank everyone who has pledged to this year's campaign. It is a compelling and challenging year at First Parish, with two important fundraising campaigns — Annual and Capital — running almost concurrently. The Annual Campaign funds the day-to-day salaries, programs and operational costs of First Parish, while the Capital Campaign, over five years, will fund a renovation and upgrade to the First Parish Meeting House.

As the June 10 Annual Meeting approaches, the Annual Campaign faces a serious shortfall of \$115,000. Our goal this year is to raise \$1,020,000 in pledges, representing a 7.4 percent increase over last year's budget. The increase is based on rising healthcare costs for First Parish employees (including one additional staff person added to healthcare benefits this year), modest 2.5 percent cost-of-living salary increases and several salary adjustments, and inflationary increases for operating expenses (utilities, postage, computer services, building supplies, etc.) and for small maintenance repairs. If the Campaign is unable to close this significant financial gap, there will be some difficult choices to make. Areas of consideration for potential cuts include cost of living increases for ministers and staff, music programs, religious education, youth programs, community suppers, administration and technology, Wright Tavern publications and the First Parish program guide.
