My childhood New England Congregationalism proclaimed a blond, blue-eyed and gentle Jesus, an invisible friend, one who taught by parable and example. "Jesus Wants Me for a Sunbeam," we would sing, in my Sunday school classes. But, as I grew and learned and questioned, I left this faith behind for Unitarian Universalism.

But what I value most about Christianity, what I have never left behind, is the meaning of Jesus precisely at this season, this birth of a child. Here is a religion, and almost uniquely so, that takes a human and holy birth, a birth to a mother named Mary, and places this holy birth at a particular time. Here is a religion that places the events of the birth and of the life of Jesus in a particular place: Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jerusalem, the Sea of Galilee, the Mount of Olives. These are places we can find on a map.

What I value most about Christianity, what I have never left behind, is that here is a faith that proclaims an incarnation, God become human, God incarnate in Jesus, and here is a meaning for Unitarian Universalists if ever there was one: this is a faith that begins with a human, a faith that looks you in the eye.

What I value about Christianity is that this can be a faith that looks you right in the eye, comes looking for you, eyes meeting another, hands meeting another. Scraping away all the chapters in my Christology textbooks, all those great councils of the Christian church that debated humanity and divinity and exiled me to heresy; scraping away all this, we have in this month of December the birth of a baby, the birth of Jesus, the beginning of something. Take all the other theological trappings away and we are celebrating this month a holiness that began with a human.

Jesus burst into this world like a flash of hope. That is why we sing this month. That is why we light our candles. This is very close to what Unitarian Universalism means to me. This is what a Unitarian Universalist does with Christmas, does at Christmas. We sing. We light candles. We hope. We hope right along with our Christian brothers and sisters for a rebirth of this hope and this light. Maybe this is a season to remember this and to remember this by looking other people in the eye ourselves.

Pastoral Care News

In this season of thanksgiving and giving, the Pastoral Care Council (PCC) acknowledges all those who have actively supported efforts to provide an area for parishioners who need to sit during coffee hour. This includes those who are unsteady on their feet, those with a disability or receiving chemo, radiation, or those who are elderly or who are pregnant or nursing a baby, plus many more. It is important to remember that the reason an individual is sitting may not be physically apparent.

Establishing this area is still in its experimental stages. The ideal place to have tables is in the Parlor next to the fireplace, but this is not possible when there is a Forum. In early October, we had the tables placed in the far corner near the stage thinking this was a quieter area. Because of feedback from individuals who would like to sit, PCC learned that negotiating the busy crowd in the Parish Hall was intimidating. In consultation with **Doug Baker**, the tables have been placed next to the wall between the two entrances, which requires the least amount of walking.

We also received feedback that the term *Safe Area* and the *Reserved* signs on the table did not feel welcoming to many in the congregation. There is power in words, so the PCC is reviewing how we can convey our message. Send me your suggestions.

This relatively small, but extremely significant act of providing an area for those who need to sit is a social action initiative addressing the issue of ableism and ageism, as well as a community-building action, showing through our actions that we are inclusive of *all* our members. Please continue to share your thoughts with the PCC.

On a different note, please give a *big thanks* to **Nicole Sheehan**, who has been our sole memorial reception coordinator for the past six months. She has done a wonderful job. Nicole will continue as coordinator, but she will be joined by **Marilyn Lowitt**, **Brooks Stevens** and **Francene Amari-Faulkner**.

Holiday Flowers: Every Christmas season the poinsettias that decorate the Sanctuary are delivered on December 26 to those parishioners who have experienced a difficult year, or who are unable to attend First Parish on a regular basis. MUSings

Over the last decade or so, our December holiday celebrations have featured the presentation of a "minor" major work by the First Parish Choir and a varying group of professional and



semiprofessional musicians from the Parish and the wider community, which I have dubbed the "First

Parish Festival Orchestra." Thanks to the generosity of a music-loving parishioner, we are able to continue the tradition this year, despite the cuts that were made to our annual music budget last spring. On December 16 (Beethoven's Birthday!), the choir will present Camille Saint-Saëns' *Oratorio de Noël* (*Christmas Oratorio*) at both services.

Rehearsing and preparing this piece has been a musical adventure of discovery for me and for the choir. The Oratorio is an early work of Camille Saint-Saëns [1835-1921], composed when he was only 23 years old. It is scored for choir, soloists, string quartet, organ and harp. After a lovely pastoral prelude, "in the style of Bach," the work begins with the Gospel of Luke's vivid depiction of the angels' appearance to the shepherds announcing the birth of Jesus. The rest of the libretto is freely paraphrased from the Psalms, the book of Isaiah, Lamentations and the Gospel of John. This rich variety of stirring choruses, lyrical solos and colorful vocal ensembles provide commentary on the meaning of Jesus' birth.

Saint-Saëns is probably best known for his orchestral works, especially his *Organ Symphony*, the symphonic poem *Danse Macabre* and, ironically, *The Carnival of the Animals*, a work he wrote as a musical joke. He actually forbade its performance during his lifetime, fearing it would ruin his reputation. The musical clarity, sense of proportion, colorful harmony and elegance of these more famous and larger works is evident in Saint-Saëns' early oratorio, the style of which was likely circumscribed by the prevailing conservative customs in French church music during the 1850's.

To me, Saint-Saëns' *Oratorio de Noël* is a charming and reverent musical meditation on the meaning of Jesus' birth. We are looking forward to sharing it with you on December 16.

TRANSYLVANIA PARTNER CHURCH COMMITTEE (PCC) UPDATE

After the wonderful November 11 choir concert and reception celebrating last summer's five separate travels to Transylvania (photos at http://firstparish.org/photos), including a total of 77 first parishioners, the PCC now turns its focus on new programs for broadening and deepening our relationships with our friends in Keresztúr.

Pilgrimages: While working on a long-term approach for regular future visits in both directions, we are focusing on two in 2008. The first is a smaller, multi-generational work trip to Keresztúr in the summer of 2008. The second is hosting a delegation from Keresztúr, culminating with the celebration of their thanksgiving with us on September 28.

Financial Assistance: In addition to continuing to support our ongoing programs, we are investigating the needs for financial assistance for the considerable renovations to the multiple buildings that the Romanian government has finally given back to the Unitarians, after decades of neglect and abuse.

Student Sponsorship: Thanks to **Sue Beck** and **Ivan Kristoffy**, all 51 students have sponsorship for the 2007-2008 academic year; one to the middle school, 37 to the Unitarian high school, and 13 to colleges and universities.
