## PASTORAL CARE NEWS

Throughout my early childhood, I often thought about the next millennium. Would I be alive? How would I celebrate? What would I be doing in 2010? I'd be 65! It all seemed so far away. I thought I would be very, very old! Well, here I am. I no longer picture myself as very, very old, even though I will qualify for Medicare in 2010.

Although it seemed to take forever for me to reach my 21st birthday, it seems like the next 44 years went by much too quickly! Carlos Castaneda teaches us to live with death at our shoulder so we are awake to the moments, people and beauty of our lives. In actuality we do live with death at our shoulders, since none of us know when we will die; it's just that most of us choose not to live in this awareness. But it is important to make certain preparations for our final exit. In February, I will be offering *The Rest of Your Life and Beyond*, a four-session class to prepare for this final event. This program is the same as the one offered two years ago, except I changed a session to explore ways of talking with our loved ones about our wishes at the end of life. It is also helpful to think about your memorial service. Is there a reading you want included or a hymn? Over the years **Gary Smith** has distributed the Personal Information Record Form, which helps parishioners make their wishes for their service known to the ministers. The form includes additional information, such as who is your health care proxy, who should be notified in case of an emergency, etc. This information is kept in a confidential file. At the end of life, this form can help your family to respect your wishes as well as in planning your memorial service. The Personal Record Form is included in this newsletter as well as in the Orders of Service for the month of January. You can also pick up a copy on the brochure rack outside the office door. No matter your age, we hope you will take time to fill out this form and return it to the office, with attention to: **Rev. Gary Smith**, **Rev. Jenny Rankin** or **Rev. Margie King Saphier**.

I give a big heartfelt thanks to **Peter Nobile** and **Tony Rodriguez**. Tony and Peter have retired from pastoral care lay ministry. I thank them for their support and for their compassionate presence to those whom they visited and called. They will be missed. We welcome **Ross Harris**, **Carolyn Shohet** and **Lois Suarez**. Ross, Carolyn and Lois have served as parish visitors for several years and will now serve as pastoral care lay ministers.

A few weeks ago, when Pam asked our children what a “carol” was, they answered, “a Christmas song.” This is our modern understanding of the genre. The word “carol” originated with the French *carole*, an early pagan dance song performed during the Winter Solstice celebration. It is easy to see how the *carole* became the “Christmas carol.”

As the First Parish Choir prepares Benjamin Britten’s *A Ceremony of Carols* (Opus. 28) for our worship services on December 20, I’ve grown increasingly aware that we are standing on the

“holy ground” of ancient Christian orthodoxies as well as the pagan rituals that predated them in Europe. The Old English texts selected and set by Britten for this unusual work reflect customs and beliefs of medieval European Christianity that have largely been lost in secular American culture. What are the “Twelve Days of Christmas”? What does the Nativity story have to do with Adam and Eve?



Is it a coincidence that the Christian festival of Candelmas (February 2) falls at the midpoint between the Winter Solstice and the Vernal Equinox, a time celebrated through many ancient pagan rituals? *The Ceremony of Carols* is a rich musical reminder of our many-layered religious and cultural heritage.

Benjamin Britten [1913-1976] composed *A Ceremony of Carols* in the spring of 1942, on a trans-Atlantic voyage aboard the *M.S. Axel Johnson* — a dangerous passage, due to German U-Boat activity. Most of the texts are Old English poems that Britten discovered in *The English Galaxy of Shorter Poems*, a volume he picked up during his ship’s stopover in Nova Scotia. These poems are steeped in a medieval understanding of God, the world and humankind. The work was originally scored for treble choir and harp. But due to its great popularity, Britten’s publishing house, Boosey and Hawkes, commissioned a setting for mixed chorus by Julius Harrison. *A Ceremony of Carols* is an unusual composition that it hard to define. It is neither an oratorio nor a pageant nor even a simple medley of Christmas carols. But through it, Britten has created a musical ritual that connects us to the ancient origins of our Yuletide celebrations.

We will welcome Judith Ross as our harpist on December 20. She will provide accompaniment for *A Ceremony of Carols*, as well as the annual entrance of our littlest angels on this special music Sunday.


## Intergenerational Gospel Choir

I realized that although our noncreedal faith isn’t always easy to explain, our youth are drawn to a community that is welcoming, accepting, gives them a sense of belonging, and allows for the freedom to search for personal meaning.

I just finished reading a great publication written by the UUA about membership, called, simply, *The Membership Journey*. While reading, I was brought along the path of membership, from a congregation's preparedness for new members, to moving beyond the welcome mat, to deepening the connections, to joining the congregation, and lastly, to the lifelong journey of membership. With each chapter, I acquired a greater understanding of the work of membership — for me as Membership

Director and for the congregation as a whole — which should be undertaken in order to sustain and deepen the membership ministry at First Parish.

For example, did you know that ...

**... membership is a dynamic process rather than a single act?** It begins when one makes the conscious choice to formally affiliate themselves with a particular congregation — yet that decision marks the beginning of the membership journey rather than its end.

**... the people who make up our congregations often find themselves so comfortable that it is hard to take a step back and see what they might look like to a visitor?** Take a fresh look at the congregation, as if you were coming to church for the first time, to find out how well the congregation is taking care of visitors and members.

**... Unitarian Universalism is one of the religious world's best-kept secrets?** (Of course you knew that!) To ensure that as many people benefit from the healing messages and community that mark Unitarian

Universalist congregations, as well as to ensure the inflow of fresh perspectives and energy needed to maintain a vital congregation, practice intentional (some say radical) welcoming and outreach.

**... providing a range of opportunities for people to experience the richness of congregational life is essential to expanding membership that is sustainable?** Committees that provide these opportunities should be open and welcoming to the energy, enthusiasm and ideas that new committee members can bring to the group.
