• First Parish to thrive, I will no longer discuss with you the
• business of the congregation, nor offer any observation or
• advice. While no hard rule bars me from attending worship
• or other church gatherings, it is recognized best practice for
• me to absent myself for a significant time.

• Enjoy your work with your interim minister and then a
• growing and rich relationship with a new settled minister. I
• wish you all well, personally and as a congregation. It has
• been such an honor and delight to have served you and lived
• among you, doing amazing things.

Mark Your Calendar — October 14-23! Celebrate 375 Years of First Parish!

We look ahead with excitement to a mid-October celebration of the 375th anniversary of First Parish in Concord. Please make note on your calendar. Plans are coming together for a wonderful week-plus of events that honor the legacy of First Parish and its very special relationship with Concord.

The purpose of this 375th celebration is to recognize our vibrant history as a faith community, acknowledge First Parish's impact on the larger world and strengthen our ties with Concord and with one another. In preparation, we are delving into our past, looking at our UU history and our deep cultural and political ties that go back in time to First Parish's Puritan beginnings as the Church of Christ in Concord, gathered on July 5 (old date) in 1636.

October 14 through 23, First Parish will mark its 375th anniversary with an array of esteemed speakers, conferences, music, historical exhibits, special events and walking tours. We are partnering with many organizations in town that are richly connected to our heritage — the Concord Free Public Library, Old Manse, Concord Museum, Emerson House and Thoreau Society.

As the October calendar of events continues to evolve, we can mention some anniversary highlights, including an exhibit at the Concord Library of First Parish's oldest documents, a reenactment of Thoreau's defense of John Brown, an amazing fashion show of UU history (sponsored by the WPA) and a scholarly conference on the legacy of First Parish. The celebration will come to a close with a grand Saturday night dinner for the congregation, followed by worship services on Sunday, October 23.

All parishioners are welcome. We will be inviting other Unitarian Universalists to join us, along with historians, social activists and scholars who are interested in our fascinating and important history.

Please stay tuned. More 375th details are forthcoming. **Anne Fortier** and **Bruce Blumberg** are cochairs of First Parish's 375th Celebration. ♦

This song has been going through my mind a lot during this exciting, challenging and turbulent year. Even as we prepare for **Gary Smith’s** retirement and celebrate his extraordinary ministry with us, we have been experiencing some anxiety and conflict about our future. “Heaven knows where we are going, and heaven knows how we will get there,” is a thought that I’m sure has crossed many a mind!



Yes, sometimes the road has been muddy this year. And there are bound to be rough patches ahead. One of the things I like about *Woyaya* is that it names that reality. If we can name it, if we as a congregation can help one another navigate those passages, offering one another a steadying hand and pointing out the obstacles on a muddy and stone-strewn path, we’ll get through together. We might be a little dirty and scratched, even stumble once in a while, but we will get there!

What gives me the most hope, though, is that phrase “we know within.” I believe that is true for First Parish in Concord. We know within. We will celebrate our 375th anniversary next fall. Kudos to Gail Carey!

Gail Carey, our incredible Children’s Choir Director, has been awarded the status of Credentialed Music Leader by the UUA’s Music Leader Credentialing Committee. She will be recognized by the UUA during the Service of the Living Tradition at GA in Charlotte later this month.



This is a big honor. There are only a few music leaders in our congregations who have achieved this status. To earn this credential, Gail completed a rigorous three-year program of course work and created a portfolio that demonstrated her skill and knowledge in 11 competency areas deemed critical for excellence in music leadership in Unitarian Universalist congregations.

Our entire music ministry has benefited from Gail’s work in this program. We offer her our congratulations and thanks!

PIPEWORK

Since the last *Pipework* update, we have gained several new additions to the organ. The mutations (color ranks that sound at intervals above the note played) have been installed in the organ’s Choir division on the right side facing. The Nazard is a completely new rank, made from scratch by Russell & Co., while the Tierce is revoiced from the old organ. This past week, the organ’s new Oboe was installed, and it added a much-needed new dimension to both the Swell and Pedal organs.

The first complete pedal rank of pipes, comprised of some of the large pipes from the old organ are almost ready for installation, as well as the Swell Mixture pipes. This mixture is again made new from scratch and comprised of some 297 pipes to nicely crown the top of the Swell division for clarity and sparkle in Baroque music, as well as hymn playing.

Once the remaining pipe chests are completed, the builder will then turn themselves totally to the making and remanufacture of the remainder of the organ pipes. Hopefully, most of the pipework should be in by early fall. ♦

that disturbed her, and what she enjoyed. She was disturbed by how poor people were living in crowded tents, and cooking inside the tents with wood fires. She was happy to tell me about how much the children enjoyed her classes in art — the younger ones cutting out hearts, to send to children in a Connecticut School; making bracelets from beads SoSo brought from NY; and having a first chance to paint. The children were sweet and SoSo was pleased that they were very interested in the class. Some showed real talent. She was surprised that cement blocks for building were made on the school site, one block at a time, and that water for the cement had to be carried from a well nearly an hour away by volunteers. (A newly enlarged cistern has been built, and water will be collected from the roof, once the drought ends.) The trip changed SoSo. Recognizing what it means to live plentifully in the United States, now she understands the turmoil and the living circumstances in Haiti and appreciates all that she has. One way we can extend a hand to these children is to collect T-shirts they can wear and also ones to wear to protect their uniforms when doing art. We'll have a box in the coatroom for T-shirts that you are willing to donate. The children will enjoy them. Thank you for your support. — Carol Dwyer

UU Service Committee Continues to Battle for Human Right to Clean Water

On April 26, 2011, the campaign for the human right to water in California overcame its first legislative hurdle. The new human-right-to-water bill (AB 685) passed with an overwhelming margin out of the Water Parks and Wildlife Committee, and the Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee passed four additional bills in this package. These developments mark the beginning of a new campaign for the human right to water — and more than 11.5 million Californians are depending on our victory for access to safe, sufficient, affordable water!

Please consider donating to the UUSC's annual appeal. Know that \$30 protects an orphaned Haitian child from abuse, trafficking and prostitution; \$65 pays for a small business loan for a woman in Kenya. Thanks to a generous matching grant, \$100 becomes \$200, providing 40 students in Afghanistan with innovative human-rights education; \$200 becomes \$400, buying a bicycle ambulance for a resettled village several miles from a health center in northern Uganda. Lobbying for Peace

Alec Walker, Rod Deck (with the blueberry pie that he had baked), and Pat Simon enjoyed a Mother's Day lobby at Rep. Tsongas' Acton office. They learned from staff that, given her extraordinary peace-building work, the congresswoman's only obstacle to support of HR 808 for a Department of Peace is the idea of a department. She wonders why the various branches of government couldn't include violence prevention programs. A cabinet-level department, with a Secretary of Peace, provides a necessary institutional platform for the wealth of expertise in violence prevention and intervention, domestically and internationally. It will coordinate a proactive, strategic approach in the development of policies that promote nonviolent solutions to conflict, throughout the government, and make peace a national priority. We were urged, in the Advocacy Skills Workshop, to be active citizens — to contact those elected to represent us; every call, every letter, every visit is tallied and gets attention to the issue. Calls to Rep. Tsongas (978-263-1951) from other towns in her district will be important in finally convincing her to support efforts that have been made for decades to create a Department of Peace in the U.S government! Childbirth Deaths in Sierra Leone To Be Topic of Amnesty International Meeting

A physician whose research helped establish that thousands of women in Sierra Leone die unnecessarily each year from complications of pregnancy and childbirth will discuss her work at the monthly meeting of Group 15, the Concord-area chapter of Amnesty International, on Tuesday, June 21, at 7 p.m. Dr. Toyin Ajayi was a principal author of an Amnesty study showing that most of those deaths could have been prevented by accessible, affordable and timely medical care. The study report, "Out of Reach: The Cost of Maternal Health in Sierra Leone," was published last year as part of an Amnesty campaign aimed at reducing high rates of maternal mortality worldwide. Dr. Ajayi is a director of the Wellbodi Partnership, a team of local and international experts working to provide pediatric care in Sierra Leone. She served as medical coordinator for the partnership in 2008-2009 and is currently completing her residency in family medicine at Boston University. The Group 15 meeting will be held downstairs at the Harvey Wheeler Center, 1276 Main Street, in West Concord. All are welcome. 


