

As I meet with new members, I am frequently asked, "Tell me about Unitarian Universalism. Where did it come from? What do you believe?" Hard questions to answer! Often, we say we are a "big tent," welcoming spiritual seekers of diverse backgrounds, world views, beliefs. Still, it isn't always easy to "get our hands around" what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist, or a congregation with that identity, in 2012.

One thing that has always helped me understand this "living tradition" of which I am a part is to learn the life stories of women and men who have dwelt in this tradition before me. Women like Clara Barton or Dorothea Dix, men like Joseph Priestley in England or Theodore Parker in America. Like us, they usually differed from one another in their views on human nature, God, what happens after we die. Like us, they often cared deeply about the world they lived in and wanted to make it better. Like us, they thought hard about what they believed, what they didn't believe, and committed their lives to an ongoing intellectual and spiritual search that could only be called a kind of "passionate seeking."

During March, to explore more deeply this living tradition we share, and to honor the interim goal of reconnecting with our history better, I will be offering a series called "Roots Hold Me Close." We'll be learning together about the Unitarian tradition outside of America and how it emerged around the globe.

During a time when the congregation is seeking a new way forward, it can be comforting — and spiritually strengthening — to "touch down" into our roots. There is a foundation under our feet. We walk on ground that has been hallowed by the spiritual fire, courage and tenacity of women and men who lived here before us. May their spirit bless us and keep us in these days.

Ministerial Intern Announced

Anthony Fisher will be First Parish’s next Ministerial Intern. Tony had enjoyed a career in educational publishing and had deep involvement in his home UU parish in Reading, Massachusetts, when he decided to pursue the ministry as a full-time calling. He entered Andover Newton Theological School as a Master of Divinity student in 2010. Tony’s warmth and his experience in UU affairs impressed the Ministerial Internship Committee, which had the privilege of reviewing packets from a number of highly qualified candidates. The sermons and service that he submitted showed spiritual and human insight and a degree of craftsmanship that would be admirable even in a settled minister. The First Parish internship is a half-time position extending over two years, and Tony will complete his coursework at Andover-Newton while serving our congregation. **Elaine Peresluha** will mentor Tony in 2012-2013, and the mentoring will fall to our newly chosen minister the following year. The Five Wishes— A Workshop to Help You Make Important Decisions

History

The Five Wishes program began in Florida with “Aging with Dignity” founder, attorney Tim Tavey. He visited Mother Teresa’s home for the dying in India. Even though the people were in humble surroundings, they were treated with compassion and love. Returning home, he lived for a year as a volunteer in her home for AIDS patients in Washington, D.C., and was deeply moved by the experience.

The Five Wishes document was introduced in Florida in 1997, with the aid of a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. It is recognized in 40 states and is available in 21 additional languages. Over 15,000 organizations nationwide have distributed over 12 million copies.

When the Five Wishes are completed, it is important to share the document with family members, health care professionals and places of worship so that one’s chosen wishes will be acknowledged and respected.

Program

Five Wishes looks at the personal, emotional and spiritual needs of a person, not just his or her medical needs. It is a legal document that lets you get the care desired when it is most needed.

Wish 1: Choosing a durable power of attorney for health care

Wish 2: Deciding what medical treatment you want or don’t want — a Living Will

Wish 3: Choosing the types of care you want — how you want your pain to be managed

Wish 4: Describing in detail how you want to be treated so that your dignity can be maintained

Wish 5: Taking advantage of the opportunity to tell others how you want to be remembered

This document is the only advanced directive that deals with spiritual matters and assists health care providers in respecting your religious beliefs.

There will be a short DVD, followed by an in-depth discussion of each of the wishes, as well as exploring how best to have a conversation with loved ones who may have difficulty making these decisions.

There are a few things in life of which we can be certain. Each day, the sun will rise and set. The ocean tide will ebb and flow. No matter how long the winter (or not!), the crocus will push its way through last fall's dried, brown leaves to spatter our gardens with points of color. Mixed among that certainty are changes, some expected and a lot more not. Circumstances change, as do priorities. We often grow and need to push ourselves forward. And sometimes we face the inevitable realization that something has to give.

For me, a time for change has come. It is with a grateful but heavy heart that I am leaving my position as Membership Director at First Parish. I have accepted a position in the city where I live, as a paraprofessional in the Early Childhood Center of the Melrose Public Schools. As a mother of an active child, an undergraduate student at Salem State University, and a deeply involved member of the Melrose UU Church, it will help tremendously to be so close to home.

I will miss greatly the staff of First Parish, who've helped me grow and provided me with a daily dose of goodwill and humor.

I will miss greatly the Membership Committee, who were so welcoming to me, and who understand what it means to be welcoming to each person who enters this church.

As a final message to you, I want you to consider this: As a congregation, you've been spending a lot of time visioning, and soon you'll decide on the direction First Parish should move toward when calling a new senior minister. Included in that visioning, consider the notion of radical hospitality. As Rev. MUSINGS

March is my least favorite month of the year. It's hard to say why. Many good things happen in March. The Nortons celebrate numerous family birthdays. Here in the Northeast, the first shoots of bulbs begin to break through the soil and the days get noticeably longer. There's much to hope for. But even so, March feels like the longest 31-day month in the year.

For me and my family there are birthdays to celebrate, but also deaths to commemorate. Inevitably, it snows on those green shoots of snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils at least once before the month is over. And yes, the days get longer, but there's that pesky time change in the middle of the month to upset the circadian clock. We're done with winter (even if it's not done with us), yet spring still feels a long way off. It's an unpredictable time of year! I wonder if it's this unsettled nature of March that makes it seem so long.



March also brings mud season. It can be difficult to imagine, as tires spin in the ruts, or boots suddenly slide beneath us that we will ever stand again on firm ground. And of course this year, March comes during the "mud season" of our interim process. It's a challenging time of change, transition, wheel spinning and sliding!

"It will be hard, we know, and the road will be muddy and rough, but we'll get there, heaven knows how we will get there, but we know we will." I know I keep coming back to these words from "Woyaya" (*Singing the Journey* No. 1020), but they seem so appropriate to this interim period that we're navigating with the guidance of **Elaine Peresluha** and the Parish Interim Team. I am grateful for their careful planning, their curiosity, their willingness to listen to difficult conversations and their courage in moving us through this muddy and rough season of transition. Their leadership and our long history of weathering change assure me that "we know within" and that First Parish will eventually come out of the mire of uncertainty with a renewed sense of our mission and our identity.

So it's March and it's mud season, both in the natural world and in our interim process. But we know within, and that the mud holds seeds of renewal that will germinate and grow, bringing the glory of spring and hope for our future. Woyaya. ♦

A high school boy came and talked to the boys about what it means to have physical courage. Several eighth grade girls came and talked about friendship. Two high school girls came to talk about beauty and the media.



Their collective words of wisdom were touching. However it is happening, either within our families, within our schools, within our community or within our parish, these kids are coming away with a sense of who they really are and a sense of self that is rooted in personal values.

Collectively, we must be doing a really good job because some of the words that were spoken could have come from wise old sages.

Here are just a few of the teens comments:

- ◆ Don’t judge people right away; some of our best friends seemed strange at first...
- ◆ Don’t over-think social situations; just try to be you.
- ◆ Tell your friends when they have something on their face; honesty is valued.
- ◆ We are more alike than we are different.
- ◆ Use adversity to grow yourself.

Not only were these discussions valuable for our younger kids; they were leadership opportunities for our teens. It gave them a chance to be the teacher and to reflect on their feelings about these issues. Their reflections were valued and considered. They articulated personal truths and named the importance of individual integrity. Going direct? If that is the theme for the interim process, it is being mirrored well in our RE program. ◆

FROM THE INTERN MINISTER

Last month I talked about choice and the freedom to choose as the hallmark of a free society and free religion and posed the following question for reflection: What guides, motivates or otherwise drives the choices we make as people of faith?



Upon reflection, it seems the quick and easy answer is that our values and beliefs guide or drive our choices. Yet, in looking at my own experience, I soon realize this is not always true. Indeed there have been times, more than I'd care to admit sometimes, when I have made choices guided or motivated by convenience, fear or anger.

Generally, such motivations don't align with my values or beliefs, which tells me that having a particular set of values or beliefs isn't really enough to compel me to draw upon them for guidance in my life. I find I need a place to practice the beliefs and values I espouse, a place where I'm held accountable for them.

The noted Unitarian theologian James Luther Adams called church a place “where we get to practice what it means to be human.” One of the gifts of a liberal religious community is that we are able to discern and practice our beliefs and values in a supportive community. Because we are human, we will inevitably stumble. We will occasionally act out of fear or anger or confusion and that's okay; for the liberal religious community does not ask perfection of our values, but a commitment to their practice. ♦

Tibetan Buddhism

T'ai Chi and Qi Gong

T'ai chi is a gentle flowing exercise that will help you build and circulate energy. Based on teachings from China, we will do qi gong movements that help you retain flexibility in all your joints. Students will also learn the Hwa Yu tai chi form, a series of connected movement that is like a slow-motion dance. Research shows that tai chi and qi gong improve stability, improve immune function, and create many of the benefits of meditation. If you've tried meditation, but find it hard to sit still, tai chi and qi gong may be the way to give yourself those benefits while gently moving your body. No past experience is necessary. Wear comfortable clothing. Instructor: **Sue Wood**

Sue Wood has been practicing Hwa Yu t'ai chi since 1984. She was taught by David Zucker. She currently continues her tai chi and qi gong study with Dr. Yang Yang of the Center for Tai Chi Studies (<http://www.chentaiji.com/>).

Being in touch with our own energy creates endless possibilities within ourselves. Mae Pagan has studied t'ai ji and qi gong for 22 years. She follows the teachings of Chungliang Al Huang and his nontraditional style of teaching t'ai ji movement as a joyful approach to

- life as well as a path to wellness. With a background in Tibetan
- Qi gong and Reiki, she provides a gentle mix of t'ai ji movement with the healing aspects of qi gong. She also holds degrees
- in philosophy, psychology and education.

Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction Program (MBSR)

- Cultivating mindfulness, or awareness of the present moment, creates the framework for this popular course modeled after the internationally recognized program established by Jon Kabat-Zinn at UMass Medical School. Research continues to suggest positive benefits from the practice of mindfulness-based stress reduction to the immune system, chronic illness, hypertension and chronic pain, as well as to the daily stresses of our busy lives. This interactive course consists of eight weekly two-hour group classes, where participants will be introduced to and practice guided mindfulness meditation, relaxation techniques, gentle yoga stretches, and self-inquiry exercises. Participants commonly report a reduction of stress-related symptoms, increased awareness and concentration, and improvement of positive coping skills at home and in the workplace. Instructor: **Pamela Katz Ressler**, RN, MS, HN-BC.

Five Wishes — The Best Gift You Can Give to Yourself and Your Loved Ones

- The Five Wishes program looks at the personal, emotional and-spiritual needs of a person, not just his or her medical needs. It is a legal document that lets one get the care one wants when it is needed the most.

Wish 1: Choosing a durable power of attorney for health care

Wish 2: Deciding what medical treatment you want or don't want — a Living Will

Wish 3: Choosing the types of care you want — how you want your pain to be managed

Wish 4: Describing in detail how you want to be treated so that your dignity can be maintained

Wish 5: Taking advantage of the opportunity to tell others how you want to be remembered

This document is the only advanced directive that deals with spiritual matters and assists health care providers in respecting one's religious beliefs.

Turner and the Transcendentalists — The Impact of Visual Artists on Thinkers
