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In muddled middles, these words by Mary Baker Eddy always remind me to sit still, be patient and appreciate the uncertainty. Something new is growing —

".... This day is merely a step in infinite progress.

It is unfoldment not time.

It brings no belief of delay in success, no disappointment.

It adds no fear, no age, no deterioration, no decay, no sin, no materiality, No belief in matter.

It only adds wisdom, power, dominion, law, and the presence of well done.

My treatment now establishes the law of this day,

And obliterates the supposition or belief in any other law.

Principle governs me and mine this day.

This day is unfoldment

In which every detail and incident is but an illustration

Of divine presence, power, and wisdom."

Mary Baker Eddy was a path maker and visionary whose faith in what she believed launched a new religion. What I take away from Mrs. Eddy's thoughts on unfoldment is that intention and attention matter. They are the

> stuff of everyday magic and miracles. When we place our attention on what matters most to us, then fortify it with our hope and intention, miracles unfold. I do not mean the magic or miracles defined by the prophets of old, nor the smoke and mirrors sort of magic with which prestidigitators arouse shock and awe. No. The miraculous perfection Mrs. Eddy speaks of is an ongoing creation in which we each participate. When people decide together or alone what is important and, shoulder-to-shoulder, put their

hearts, their minds and their muscle to the task, their best

intentions unfold, like magic. Voila! A miracle.

First Parish has exceeded all of my expectations for mature attention and intentions. What you have come to depend upon has changed. Some have been rocked by pretty significant community tumult this fall, Jenny Rankin's resignation, my recommendations, staff changes and personal changes in members' lives. Many noticed, accepted and expressed minimal needs for reassurance before moving

September-October News and Notes

[This article was suspended last month because of the latebreaking news of Jenny Rankin's resignation. It's included here to report on the summertime activities of the Standing Committee.]

The Standing Committee (SC) has completed its first three monthly meetings in July, August, and September and has held its annual retreat in September.

Our regular work has included items from our year-long plan to review our governing policies (see September issue of the *Meeting House News* for the schedule). We have also established two working subcommittees to help with our governance issues.

- Laurie Van Loon is chairing the subcommittee on Congregational Discernment. This subcommittee will review our current governing policies on how we link to the congregation, and suggest ways to improve.
- Andrea Siani is chairing the subcommittee on Evaluation. This subcommittee will review our current governing policies on how we evaluate the performance of the senior minister and suggest ways to improve.

Our retreat this year allowed us to complete an everyfour-year refresh of our First Parish Strategic Ends. The new strategic ends flowed from our new First Parish mission statement, adopted at the annual meeting in June:

Our Mission Statement: First Parish in Concord is a welcoming Unitarian Universalist congregation that seeks to deepen spiritually, build community, and make a positive difference in the world.

Our New Strategic Ends are:

We at First Parish open our doors to everyone. We actively welcome one and all, enabling each person to find a place in our community.

- We at First Parish are visibly committed to our UU principles and to the larger UU community, and we honor our historical, intellectual and spiritual roots.
- We at First Parish come together to deepen spiritually through meaningful worship, mutual care, and opportunities for inspiring experiences.
- We at First Parish engage with and support one another through life's journey.
- We at First Parish work to make a positive difference in the world and are thereby transformed.

- Organizational Structure Review Team Report. We
- received a report we had requested from Rev. Elaine
- Peresluha. Her report presented the facts from her
- . Organizational Structure Review Team (OSRT) and her
- three recommendations for a sustainable organization. We
- endorsed Elaine's recommendations and took no action to
- implement the recommendations except to explain them to
- the congregation. Laurie Van Loon and Jake Nunes headed
- the team to organize congregational "Listening Sessions" for
- both the Strategic Ends and these recommendations.
- [As this September-October report was going to press, we
- · received news of Jenny Rankin's resignation and we reorgan-
- ized the Listening Sessions to accommodate this major event.]

October-November News and Notes

- Our six (6) listening sessions have just concluded, and all the comments from the congregation are being transcribed
- for study. An estimated total attendance of 144 discounted
- for repeat visitors becomes about 110. The responses cov-
- ered a broad range of topics, including the Strategic Ends,
- Elaine Peresluha's recommendations for an improved
- structure, and, of course, Jenny Rankin's resignation.
- The Standing Committee and Elaine will both be assimilat-
- ing the results over the next few months. My personal thanks to the many SC members, PIT facilitators, Reverend
- Elaine, and of course, interested parishioners, who made
- these sessions so rich.
- We on the Standing Committee hope we have begun a new
- tradition of twice-annual listening sessions that will strengthen the link between the congregation and the SC
- and deepen everyone's awareness of our UU heritage of
- Congregational Polity.
- Our October Standing Committee meeting first explored
- our SC-Head-of-Staff Governing Policy (a switch in topic
 from November, as published in the Annual Agenda of the
- · September Meeting House News), and then went on to
- spend most of an hour editing and approving the final draft
- of the Employment Agreement for the new Senior Minister
 - to be sent to the Ministerial Search Committee.
- A major news item was Elaine's announcement that
- generous contributors have closed the gap in the operating
- budget. Elaine expects to collect additional contributions to the "fund that will be matched." Please contribute if you
- can.
- November will see the fashioning of SC and Head-of-Staff goals for the rest of the year, a first look at our 2012-2013
- budget, and continued work on our Governing Policies on
- Means for the operating staff (a switch in topic from
- October in the Annual Agenda).

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PASTORAL CARE NEWS

The Advisory Council — Another Arm of **Pastoral Care**

You have read in this space during the last two months about what the Caring Connection and the Lay Ministers do. There is another arm of pastoral care which is the Pastoral Care Advisory Council (PCAC), whose mission is to offer advice to the ministers and to promote pastoral care in order to extend and strengthen its reach. The council meets every six to eight weeks and works in collaboration with the Reverend Jenny M. Rankin. Council members are: Enid Boasberg, Irmi Doane, Sue Dobbie, Judy Dembsey, Berni Jenkins, Pam Ressler and Catilin Selle.

Council members liaison with Religious Education, the Choir and the Women's Parish Association to see where there are pastoral needs. A Pastoral Care Handbook was created a number of years ago and is periodically updated to describe various aspects of pastoral care, including job descriptions to insure continuity in the program. A member of the council, during the past four years and currently, has taken on responsibility for the maintenance of the pastoral care library. It is located in the hallway just before the Brooks Room and is available to all parishioners with a self-serve checkout system. With Doug Baker's assistance, we see that a memorial wreath stands in the Sanctuary during December. Parishioners may attach ribbons to acknowledge a loved one who has died.

Last year, when the church no longer funded a Minister for Pastoral Care, the Advisory Council members took on additional responsibilities to ensure the continuity of some aspects of the pastoral care program. The

The bulletin board in the downstairs hallway now is maintained by a council member who also sees to the distribution of the Christmas and Easter flowers to those who have experienced some life difficulty.

Other activities occurred this past year. After being approached by one of the lay ministers expressing concern that more activities were needed for our senior members, 65 years of age and over, the "Tuesday Group" was formed. Additionally two programs were provided — "The Five Wishes" and "Women in Transition."

Come Create Shawls!



MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

The Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) wants you to know what's happening in November and December. We have completed the online Congregational Record (CR) that ministers look at to determine whether they are interested in applying for a vacancy. During November, UUA ministers in search look over all the CR's published online by UUA and indicate which churches they are interested in. They indicate their interest directly to the UUA Transitions Office (headed by our ministerial settlement rep, Rev. Keith Kron).

On November 30, Keith will provide the MSC with a list of ministers who are interested in our Senior Minister vacancy. In December, we begin the process of reviewing ministerial records from those interested in First Parish. When we determine there is mutual interest, we then exchange packets containing much more information. Our packet is nearly complete and will take the form of a password-protected Website. Once the MSC reviews packets, we will conduct preliminary telephone interviews with the candidates that look best to us. And finally, near the end of December, we plan to have a list of our top three to four candidates. More on what's ahead in the December issue of the *Meeting House News*.

Page from the Shawl Ministry Notebook

Recently, a friend held up a book to me and said, "I am so happy to have found this book!"

I looked at the book, passed a snap judgment, rolled my eyes, and snarled, "Ohhh, not *that* author!"

Though it is our congregations that covenant to affirm and promote our UU principles, as a member of a Unitarian Universalist congregation I try to live in a way that demonstrates the principles. It is a spiritual practice to consistently affirm that all people have inherent worth and dignity. It is a spiritual practice to respect the interdependent web of all existence.

In that moment when I snapped at my friend, I was not living out the UU principles. I was not living as though my friend had inherent worth and dignity. Because we are all a part of the interdependent web, when I scorned my friend's choice of reading material, I disrespected my choices as well. I disrupted our relationship because of my own dislike of a book he was looking forward to reading.

We may disrupt our relationships, we may break the covenant our congregations make with each other, and we can fall out of right relationship all the time. We are human and we make mistakes, but one of the amazing aspects of our Unitarian Universalist faith is that because we are a covenantal faith, we can try again. We can repair our ruptured relationships! We can listen deeply with compassion and loving kindness. We can apologize for our mistakes and misunderstandings. We can offer forgiveness.

When we slip up and snarl at those around us, we are breaking down relationships. When we ignore, brush off, or don't notice those around us, we prevent relationships. To build and strengthen our relationships, we may need to learn to step out of our snap judgments. We may need to be willing to practice affirming the inherent worth and dignity of all people. To do this, we may need to practice saying, "It is good to see you today!" And we may need to practice knowing and feeling deep in our hearts that indeed it is good!

I took a slow breath and asked myself, "Why are you being rude? You care about this person. Be kind. It is good to see him today. And it is good to see him happy to have found this book." I smiled, looked at my friend, and said, "I am sorry that I snapped at you. I am happy that you found the book you were looking for. I have not read that author; tell me a bit about her." And then I listened and found in my heart that it was true!

In my experience, words often fail when I'm trying to describe what music does or is. So when someone like Peter Sellars gets it so right, I appreciate it! I received these words as a gift of

grace — words that beautifully expressed what I have observed and experienced in this ministry of music.

For me, Sellars captures an essential truth about the beauty and the risk of singing. Hurling the whole human being into space. That sounds as dangerous as Felix Baumgartner's 22-mile "freefall." Yet we do this, in our own small way, when we take a breath, open our mouths and sing — no matter if we are "trained professionals" or shower singers.

And what is the "impact" of that freefall? An "enormous spiritual release." The power to unite and to touch and to share what is "most inward." With others, in community. This is how the By Your Side Singers gently hold people at bedsides. This is what our children offer, with their pure voices, when they lead us in worship. This is what we all may share when we sing together at Rise Up Singing and at choir rehearsals and in Sunday worship.

Hurling ourselves into space. A freefall. Who knew singing could be so risky? And so deeply fulfilling? •

What Does the Partner Congregation Committee (PCC) Do? The PCC serves as steward of the congregation-to-congregation partnership between FP and the Unitarian Church in Székelykeresztúr. I like to use the term "steward" because, although the PCC organizes the activities supporting the partnership (visits, fundraisers, communications, student scholarships, etc.), all of us at First Parish — not just the PCC — share the primary role of nuturing and growing the partnership.

The September Visit by Our Keresztúri Friends. In September, the entire First Parish community experienced a wonderful visit with 12 travelers from Székelykeresztúr. During their 11-day stay, the Keresztúri visitors were welcomed into the homes and hearts of FP families, toured the Boston region, shared time with our youth during classes at CCHS and at their Ferry Beach retreat, visited with church leaders, and learned about our common Unitarian heritage. Many people worked hard to make sure that everyone in the FP community had a chance to experience our cherished relationship with Székelykeresztúr directly and in a very real way. On behalf of the PCC and the entire congregation, I want to thank everyone who donated time, talents and money to support this important visit!

July 2013 Family Pilgrimage. We now turn our attention to other activities, including next summer's Family Pilgrimage to Transylvania, intended for middle- and high-school-age youth and parents. This ten-day visit will take place in late July or early August, and will provide an unprecedented opportunity to get to know our Keresztúri brothers and sisters, while having a great time and cementing further our partnership. We were able to hold a couple of information sessions about the trip while our Keresztúri visitors were here, and we expect to have another session or two before the registration deadline on November 15. 

"A Personal Window Into Tibet"

"Energy, Ethics, and the Far Future: An Astrophysicist Speculates on Global Warming."

Humans are now the only species on Earth able both to communicate culturally and to construct technologically. We are the only ones capable of knowing our past and worrying about our future. Just how wise we are, however, is an issue of considerable uncertainty.

This illustrated talk and discussion will explore the subject of energy, notably humankind's use and abuse of it, as well as our future reliance upon it. Energy helped bring us forth, it now maintains our well being, and it will likely determine our destiny.

All things considered, within just a few centuries our civilization may find itself up against a fundamental limit to growth—an energy challenge that both drives growth yet checks growth.
