There will be no clearer indication of First Parish's ability to move into the next chapter of its 380-year life than the outcome of the 2014 Annual Pledge Campaign starting this month. The ability of the congregation to raise the money First Parish needs to carry out its mission will be a clear sign of the commitment of its members and friends. I am hopeful that we can both live within our means and increase the effectiveness of our programs next year. This will take your participation.

I am a minister who likes to know what is really going on. And I like to speak the truth. That the congregation of First Parish passed a budget last June with a \$30,000 hole in it has made this year a difficult one. The promise of an auction that would raise \$30,000 did not materialize. So, other than some money that came in from the solar panel fundraiser, the line items for increases in programing have gone unfunded.

We have lived within our means this year, but it has been disappointing not to have more flexibility to do new and interesting things. This June we are not passing a budget that is not backed up by pledges.

We can be proud of the gains we have made this year. First Parish paid one third of its UUA dues after years and years of not paying anything. And First Parish staff members received long-overdue raises to their salaries. But these gains are

only helping us get from the "basement" to the "first floor" when it comes to supporting the work of First Parish. It may take us a couple of more years to get on truly solid financial footing — and I am ready and willing to lead us there. Step by step we can get our congregation back on track for more stability, more ministry and more outreach. There is nothing glamorous about an Annual Pledge Campaign — it simply must be done. I hope you will join the team of dedicated First Parish members who are working on this year's campaign and give generously when you are asked.

Don't miss the exciting opportunity to be some of the first people to pledge to First Parish during our Celebration Sunday services on Sunday, March 9. Come ready to make a pledge that morning. As we "spring forward" into Daylight Savings Time that morning, let us spring forward into First Parish's bright, realistic future too. Together we can do it. See you in church.

STANDING COMMITTEE NEWS AND NOTES

One regular feature of the annual calendar of the Standing Committee's (SC) is to query the congregation in the fall about the next year's strategic budget priorities. We order these priorities in the early winter and pass them along to **Rev. Howard Dana** and **Fifi Ball**. They prepare a draft budget to be reviewed by all in late April before the congregation's vote to approve it at the Annual Meeting in June.

This year the SC held two budget listening sessions in the fall and sent its integrated results to Howard and Fifi on January 24 (see below). Howard and Fifi wove these priorities into three possible budget goals for the Annual Pledge Campaign.

In past years, First Parish has been challenged by the overlap of creating a draft budget while also running an annual pledge campaign. This year, we will remedy this problem by concluding the Annual Pledge Campaign by May 1. In April (on a date to be announced), the Standing Committee, Howard, and Fifi will present the draft budget for congregational review.

2014-15 Strategic Budget Priorities of First Parish

In order to help everyone prepare for this April budget review, here is a copy of our January 24 memo.

Subject: Strategic Priorities for 2014-2015 Budget for First Parish

Over the past seven months we on the Standing Committee have been assessing the congregation's expressed desires for next year's budget. We have integrated these desires with needs that we, as representatives of the congregation, feel are important. Below is our integrated list of Strategic Budget Priorities:

1. Continue the following new initiatives of last year's budget.

- A. To move staff salaries toward the UUA's median salary.
- B. To ensure staff salaries match contracted portion of each role's median salary.
- C. To include a cost-of-living adjustment in staff salaries.
- D. To move closer toward recommended level of contribution to the UUA.

- 2. Strengthen First Parish ministries in Pastoral Care and Religious Education.
- 3. Address further repayments of remaining portion of the building loan from the Trustees.
- 4. Enhance First Parish technological infrastructure in ways that improve clarity and accessibility of information and streamline communication among church groups and activities.
- 5. Consider creative funding approaches for specific congregational initiatives.
- 6. In general, ensure that the budget efficiently and effectively supports the mission, ministries and activities of the Church.

We believe these priorities are in large measure congruent with your priorities and we look forward with anticipation to seeing your draft budget(s). We would like to request that you prepare three versions of the budget: likely, pessimistic and optimistic.

First Parish Treasurer **Suzanne Lowe** would be happy to answer any questions you may have.

I got \$1.00 per week for my allowance from my father. I was to then divide the dollar up into three glass jars. I put fifty cents in the jar labeled “Long-Term Goals,” twenty-five cents into “Short-Term Goal,” and fifteen cents into the [Specific Toy] jar. My dad would then ask what I wanted to do with the remaining ten cents. One Saturday morning he drove me to the candy store. I zipped into the store, looked all through the tantalizing candy, and chose one piece of scarlet red, lipstick-shaped candy. I had to choose carefully because I knew I only had that one dime in my pocket.

My father taught me how to build savings, plan for specific expenses or luxury items, and how to make financial choices in the moment. These lessons have served me well throughout my life. I have held a wide variety of jobs; all have been emotionally, spiritually or mentally enriching, but few have been financially enriching. I learned early how to survive on little income and how to make financial choices. As a socially conscious adult I actively make financial decisions based on my desire to do good in the world. Money is power and I choose to use my power to heal the earth so that my seventh generation grandchildren have access to life’s bounty. I choose to live in a tiny studio in Concord Center so that I can walk to work, rather than drive. I chose to cancel my gym membership, reduce the data option on my smart phone, and I no longer receive DVD’s from Netflix, so that I am able to fulfill my financial pledge to First Parish in Waltham, where I am a member.

Last year, when I received my request from the Waltham annual appeal team, I thought long and hard about how I wanted to approach my pledge. In previous years I gave a small lump sum directly from my student loan checks. However, last year was the first year in five that I had a regular income and I wanted to do something different and generous. I love church. I love Unitarian Universalism. I believe we are doing good in the world and I want this movement to flourish.

Fifty dollars is not very much money for some of us. It is dinner and a movie, a week of groceries, just over a tank of gas, one month of a gym membership, three pounds of really great fairly traded coffee. Fifty dollars per month is what I chose to give last year, about two percent of my gross income. In my efforts to trust the abundance of life and sustain that which makes the world a better place for all beings, I choose to put my dime in the glass jar labeled “Church.” ♦

The story of money brought by my maternal family tells of hard work and abundance. My paternal story of money tells of community support and luck. The story of money brought to my family of origin is a blend of these two.

I grew up with all the financial resources I needed. I remember anxiety when we were living on one income. I was taught to save my allowance for personal use, but also to give from my savings to those who needed it. As a teenager, I pledged to my church before I was asked. It felt like what I was called to do by that community. I'm sure that action was not random, but modeling that of my parents and mentors.



As a young adult, I find myself living in between the upper-middle-class cushion of money and the prospects of my future in ministry and my partner's future in music, where we might not have that same cushion. And I'm beginning to learn about inheritances. I'm learning that my giving is not dependent on my current income alone.

Thinking of my money story, I'm brought back to a conversation I had with a member of the pledge drive team at my home church. Over coffee at Main Street Café, we talked about what our church means to us, what we love about Unitarian Universalism, class, community, Our Whole Lives, church membership, coffee hour ...

And then, a wide silence, and he shyly handed me my pledge card. Realizing I had forgotten to do the math on how much I'd planned to give, I asked if I could take the card home. I explained, "I know I'm giving away three percent of my earned income this year, but I'm splitting that among a few organizations close to my heart."

His eyes widened, when I mentioned the percent I planned on giving. I could see that that number did not fit the person he saw across the table: a young adult, a student, a debtor.

But he didn't see someone who saves six percent of her income each month; someone who feels blessed (and sometimes guilty) by the promise of inheritances; someone who thinks about what it would take to adopt a practice of tithing.

Three percent is a number that works for me, right now. It's a number that pushes me a bit out of my current comfort zone. My future inheritances. This is a privilege I have. A privilege that, I feel comes with a responsibility to give. ♦

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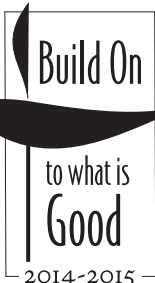

I've written often about being an intern here at First Parish and how valuable this experience is for a minister in training. You are a marvelous teaching congregation in so many ways.



First, you are a very welcoming group! You'll remember that there was a lot going on at the beginning of the 2012-2013 church year and a new intern might have easily been an unwelcome distraction, but from day one I was invited into the conversation and thus quickly felt that I was part of the community.

Second, you provide wonderful feedback, given constructively. Everyone seems to understand that the best way to offer suggestions is to first offer praise and I have appreciated both. Internships are all about learning and growing and smoothing out the rough edges, and that doesn't happen without people taking an interest and providing their insights. You do this very well.

Our annual pledge campaign is starting this month and sometimes I hear, “All we talk about is money!” In the denomination in which I was raised, we actually did not talk about money. Not at all. Nor did we talk about leadership, or sermons, or the problems within our parish. My family had no say in who spoke from the pulpit, who led our religious education programming, or how our parish spent its money. All decisions were out of our hands and we were ... led.

At First Parish, we must talk about money because all of these decisions are actually in our hands.

Here, we are not just led; we lead. We primarily talk about money in March. We talk about money because we do not have an archdiocese giving us money and making our decisions for us. Instead, we have the freedom to choose our leaders. We have the freedom to install solar panels and compost coffee grounds in our kitchen. We have the freedom



to have our parents share what is important to them about the values their children learn. Freedom like this comes with a cost.

Quite simply, you directly pay for the maintenance of your building that houses your congregation. You directly pay your staff’s salaries. You directly pay for educating the youth of this parish and caring for your elderly. You directly pay for the care of your parish community.

Sometimes this Parish even continues to talk about money into April and May and June. Leaders of the Parish do not like to do this either — it feels like begging for the support of something that many of us deeply believe in — this community. After all, it is this community that will dedicate your children, marry your children and bury the people you love.

First Parish is not a charity; it is a Parish that has a finite number of stewards who want to make sure the Parish is ready to be there when you need us most. Please consider your stewardship carefully and generously. I know my husband **Mark** and I will, because you trust us just as we trust you. This is no magic trick. We need you — your time, your talent and your treasure. ♦

MUSINGS AND MUSIC NOTE

Recently, *Creator* magazine, an ecumenical resource for religious leaders invited me to write an article about leading a music ministry in challenging financial times. This request invited me to ponder the practices and attitudes I have developed during these years of transition and reduced financial resources that have helped me stay centered and energized for this music ministry. As we begin our Annual Pledge Campaign this month, I'd like to share some of these with you:

1. Keep making music: This, after all, is my job — and my calling. Making music centers me spiritually and brings me joy. In my experience, music can bring comfort to the grieving and release to the dying, nurture confidence in the timid and awe the skeptic. In times of upheaval and transition, we can embrace one another through music, remembering our capacity for harmony in the midst of conflict.



2. Use the music budget responsibly. I support transparency in the budget process. I try to share financial information openly. Often non-musicians are unaware of the expense associated with maintaining a choir library, music licensing and fair compensation for musicians. The costs of instrument maintenance and tuning may also come as a surprise. I document expenses thoroughly and promptly, following established policies and procedures.

3. Stay in touch with the Director of Operations and the Bookkeeper. I check in regularly with **Fifi Ball** and **Tina Storey**. It is better to be a part of the conversation when financial decisions need to be made — even difficult ones — than to be unpleasantly surprised by an outcome. By staying in the conversation and calmly naming my concerns, I try to be a constructive presence.

4. Pledge as generously as possible. My husband **Peter** and I have chosen to continue increasing our pledge each year, despite my level salary and some significant cuts to the music budget. Gradually, we've achieved a level of giving that helps us focus on our own abundance, rather than scarcity. Our pledge expresses our commitment to the whole ministry of the church, not just the music ministry. It also expresses our gratitude for this, our family's spiritual home.

May abundance lead to gratitude, then to generosity. ♦

When **Pam Howell** and I first started talking about the youth service trip to West Virginia this April, we knew that we were going to ask the youth to fund-raise to make their trip sustainable. We set a goal of \$100 per youth going on the trip.

This challenge was important to me for two reasons: (1) it would encourage the youth to work for their service trip, not just have it handed to them, and (2) it would help the youth spread the message to the wider congregation that they are committed to making youth service trips financially self-sustaining.

The youth accepted our challenge and surpassed their goal. Between the Haunted House in October and Rock 'n' Roll Bingo in February, the youth group raised over \$1,500 to support their service trip to West Virginia. This will mostly be put toward need-based scholarships for youth going on the service trip, and an in-kind donation to the organization we're working with in West Virginia.

I'm so proud of our youth, and think they are a model for how many groups within our congregation could show their commitment to this community. Our youth love this church, and by making their trip self-sustaining they are giving back to our community. And...we ALL had a lot of fun in the process. ♦
