For me, music and the arts have always provided a pathway to belonging. At summer camp, a guitar and a campfire could create a circle of song; in school, the choir, orchestra and theater folks were “my people.” In every church my family attended, singing hymns helped me feel part of the congregation and learn the tradition. As a life-long chorister, I knew from childhood that I could be a worship leader. This sense of belonging and creative leadership is what we hope to inspire in the music ministry at First Parish.



Belonging, at its best, means offering something meaningful to others and being open to receiving what others have to offer you. There is nothing like making music together to build this kind of relationship: the exchange of giving and receiving are simultaneous and continuous.

Our music and arts ministry at First Parish provides avenues for people of all ages to participate in that continuous circle of belonging, through music, drama, photography, fine art. There are the Children’s Choirs, Youth Gospel Singers, First Parish Choir, Contemporary Ensemble, Rise Up Singing, By Your Side Singers, poetry readings, photography club, concerts, plays. This summer, I was struck by the definition of “call” that Rachel Baker articulated in her sermon: Call is “that thing you can’t not do.” Building community through music and the arts is that thing I “can’t not do,” no matter where I am. It is the foundation of our First Parish music and arts ministry. I am blessed to work with a talented staff of music leaders, Gail, Anderson and Eric, who share this calling. And we are grateful for the many dedicated parishioners—of all ages—who seek ways to deepen spiritually, build community and make a positive difference in the world through the arts. As we begin this new church season, I hope you will ponder how you can be a part of that circle of giving and receiving that is the First Parish arts ministry.

Social Action Community

In high school English class, I was taught to write a "hamburger" essay. This consisted of a top bun (introduction); lettuce, tomato, patty, (3 arguments, from least to most substantive); and bottom bun (conclusion). It seems silly, but the method got good results... from English teachers and SAT adjudicators.



The hamburger essay method didn't work at all when I tried writing autobiographical essays later in life. And as a seminarian, I had to learn to write a good autobiography, because every few months we're asked to submit an essay that gives "a reasonably full account of your life," and every few weeks we're asked about part of our journey to ministry.

As I began to write and tell my story more, I learned about what makes a good story. I learned how to make people laugh, and cry. I learned how to tell testimonials and stories for fun. To learn all this, I had to free myself of the confines of the hamburger essay and write from my heart.

I know that telling or writing a story from the heart takes practice. It takes unlearning "the right way," and relearning how to express emotion and conviction. Each week, when a member of our community lights the Social Action Community Candle, we're hearing a piece of their social action story. We all know what it feels like when someone tells a great story from the pulpit; but not everyone has the tools and confidence to write that great story.

I want to hear more of your great stories from the pulpit. And I want you to feel confident that these stories will get a fabulous response. So this church year, I'm planning on hosting a series of SAC Candle Writing Workshops. The first one will be on September 14 from 11:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. If you can't make this one, I'll host the same workshop in December and March. The goal of these workshops will be to write compelling, inspiring SAC Candle testimonials to be read during a subsequent Sunday worship. We'll learn how to write a testimonial, write our own stories, and workshop each other's stories to increase the impact. Space in each workshop is limited to ten participants. At our June 8, 2014, meeting, outgoing and incoming SC members discussed the Standing Committee evaluation of our Senior Minister, Rev. Howard Dana. At the June 22, 2014, meeting, it was the Standing Committee’s turn, as Howard and the Standing Committee reviewed the Standing Committee’s progress against its annual goals. RE News

One 10:00 a.m. Service this Year

This year will be different at First Parish. We will have one single service at 10:00 a.m. The RE Council and I have worked to adjust our programming in a way that will best serve our children. We also think we have made it more manageable for parents. As always, we want to hear from you as we move into the year. Let us know what is working and what isn't. We want to know your experience and how we can best meet the needs of our families.

Here are some thoughts about how to make things more pleasant for your family on Sunday morning. You could plan to arrive at 9:30 a.m. and park over on Keyes Road. It is a five-minute walk to First Parish. There will be a café set up in the kitchen, with coffee and muffins. Maybe your family would like to meet a friend and have a snack before church. Maybe you would like to sit in the pews and watch the choirs rehearse for worship. Maybe your family would like to walk the labyrinth or prepare the bullion in the winter months. You could even arrive earlier (9:00 a.m.) and participate in a small group session, leaving your children with our teenagers and RE staff.

During church, we will reserve the very front pews for our 5th, 6th and 7th graders so they can sit with one another for the beginning of worship. The rest of the children will be called forward when it is time for the Message to Children. All children will be dismissed to their classrooms after the message.

After church, you can pick up your child at their classroom and then decide if you would like to stay for a program offering at 11:30 a.m. There will be discussion groups, committee meetings and the Forum. There will even be teens and RE staff to care for your children.

Does it sound like we have been busy preparing for you and your family? We have! We want First Parish to be a place that feels like a second home. This is where your mind, heart and soul are nourished, and where your children grow up in a faith community that knows their name and cares about their dreams. We hope you find true friendship and a caring community within our parish doors.

Religious Education Staffing Changes

Emily Wheeler has resigned as RE Administrator, effective August 16. Emily left to pursue her other community efforts. I would like to thank Emily for her dedicated service to the children of First Parish. I am sure she will be missed, and families are welcome to write a note of thanks to Emily and leave it in my mailbox. I would be happy to deliver them to Emily in late September.

Our programming needs in religious education have changed significantly over the last two years. With email and online curricula, we need less help with administration and more help in our program areas. Because of this, we are taking this opportunity to change our staffing model to include an Assistant Director of Religious Education. This position will serve a broader and more encompassing need in our RE program, specifically focusing on our 0-1st grade families and our newest and youngest members in Little RE. Members of the RE Council and I have interviewed several promising candidates and will keep you posted on our progress.

Child Dedication Service and Covenant Circle This Fall

This November 23 our congregation will gather for an important part of the life of our church, our children. We believe that every child brings new life and hope into the world. This Child Dedication Ceremony allows families who are part of our congregation to formally bless the life of their children of all ages, signifying their hopes as well as the congregation's promise to support and nurture our children throughout their spiritual lives.

Prior to the Dedication, the RE Council will be hosting a Covenant Circle for Parents. We will meet three Sundays following the service, and there will be child care provided for all ages. This is a chance for parents to connect with each other in a meaningful way and contemplate parenting from a Unitarian Universalist perspective. The book, *Tending the Flame: The Art of Unitarian Universalist Parenting*, by Michelle Richards, is not required reading but will help to focus our conversations.

On Ukraine – by a Native Ukrainian
Dr. Larisa Goncharenko, MIT Haystack Observatory

The developments in Eastern Ukraine continue as a dramatic and deadly cat-and-mouse game between the Ukrainian government and neighboring Russia, including the tragic backdrop of the shoot down of flight MH20 with the loss of nearly 300 lives, as well as a dramatically rising number of Ukrainian civilian casualties. Dr. Larisa Goncharenko, a research scientist at MIT Haystack Observatory and native of the Donetsk area of Eastern Ukraine, will illuminate the history of Ukraine and Russia leading to the current situation. Also she will explore possible future developments, all with knowledge and insights that only a native Ukrainian can have.



Dr. Goncharenko was raised and schooled in Eastern Ukraine, with members of her family still living in the Donetsk area. Larisa received her degrees from Kharkov Polytechnic University and came to MIT Haystack Observatory as a post-doctoral fellow in 1996, followed by her appointment in 1997 to a permanent research position in upper atmospheric physics. Her research involving sudden warming events in the stratosphere and the propagation of energy through layers of the atmosphere have received recent prominence in helping to promote further understanding of the causes and consequences of global warming.
