REflections

To all the First Parish community members that attended the Religious Education Congregational Conversations: Thank you for your thoughtful, creative, and caring participation. Your feedback steered the design of next year's Religious Education program, influenced next year's worship planning process, contributed to the job description for our next religious education professional, and helped formulate criteria for reviewing candidates. On my desk I keep a notebook with a compilation of themes from our conversations, formulated by Leslie Pelton, Caroline Minkin and Lora Venesy, transcripts of our discussions, and a quantitative analysis of participants' recorded thoughts. I refer to this information on a daily basis. Thank you for guiding our RE Program and search process to reflect First Parish's needs, hopes and dreams.

Many hands are planning for the next year and the new settled professional. Rev. Howard Dana, RE Council Chair Jeff Brainerd, Standing Committee member and RE Council liaison Lora Venesy, RE Council member Leslie Pelton, previous RE Council Chair Eric Moore and longtime First Parish members Suzanne Foley make up the Search Committee and are well into their tasks of assessing candidates. Council members, volunteers, and staff are reviewing our calendar, sending out surveys to assess this year's implementation of the UUA Tapestry of Faith Curriculum, coming up with ideas on how to welcome new families to the church and creating our new on-line registration process. RE Council member Sarah Wilfert is planning an appreciation, family-friendly dinner to acknowledge all the many folks that contributed to making this year of transition as steady and successful as possible. Please attend. You will also hear about our exciting plans for next year.

Keep an eye out for an email asking you to register—online!—children and youth for RE, as well as giving you a chance to sign up to teach next year. A roster of dedicated, experienced teachers in the fall will support our new RE professional's transition.

In addition, please consider joining the newly forming Religious Education Pool of Volunteers. The RE Council is organizing an additional layer of support by identifying a group of 30 to 40 volunteers willing to help with specific, short-term tasks. Requests will go out via email as needs arise. Examples include greeting visiting families, reviewing class curricula, creating publicity materials, and/or assisting with a children's Chapel service. In addition to sustaining the program, this is an easy way to become or stay involved, meet people, and provide for our children's faith development.

As my time as your interim draws to a close, I am working hard to provide for a smooth transition of leadership—much needs to be documented to be passed on. As I am occupied with these transitional tasks, I am thankful I have had the opportunity to be with you as you process leadership change. I am so thankful to have met and gotten to know so many First Parish folks—children of all ages, RE Council members, teachers, parents, and the many congregants who provided happiness, support, help and encouragement. I am so appreciative of Assistant Director of Religious Education Dawn Van Patten with whom it is a joy to collaborate. She brings such gifts. I have loved working with all the First Parish staff—to a person, they are supportive, humorous, optimistic and caring. This is a strong community able to withstand, and even thrive, through change. I am excited for the future.

Social Action Community

Back in January, I took a class on community organizing with Rev. Burns Stanfield, the long-term minister of the Fourth Presbyterian church in South Boston. Community organizing is based upon the principle that power is neutral. That is, power



itself is not bad or good. Under this basic assumption, community organizers bring people together to address commonly held passions: to change social policy, create affordable housing, etc. Obama's 2008 election, which was run on basic community organizing principles, showed our country the power of grassroots organizing for social good.

The more time passes, the more I realize that people of faith—religious professionals and active laity alike—could learn a lot from community organizers. We have the people resources we need to build power; we just have to figure out what our members are passionate about, and bring them together and work on that.

Imagine if we lit a fire under the neutral power in our congregation and used that power for good. What would that look like? What would we do? Who would be involved?

Fiscal Year 2016 Budget Update: The Annual Pledge Campaign finished up on May 3. Despite a very well-run Annual Pledge Campaign and the generosity of many parishioners who pledged, we are still short of our lowest fundraising goal. At our meeting on May 10, the Standing Committee reviewed a first draft budget, presented by Rev. Howard Dana and Director of Operations, Fifi Ball. A number of measures were discussed to reduce costs and increase revenues. Congregation members will have an opportunity to provide input on the budget at congregational discussions to be organized and facilitated by the First Parish Finance Committee, with presentations by Fifi Ball and Treasurer Tom Wilson.

Annual Meeting 2015: The First Parish Annual Meeting is scheduled for June 14 at 11:30 a.m. Child care will be provided. At the meeting, the congregation will hear reports from staff and committees, vote on officers and committee members, approve delegates to General Assembly, approve the budget for

next year, and more. All First Parish members and friends are invited and encouraged to attend. However, only members who signed the Membership Book at least 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting may vote. Finally, congratulations to Mark Richards, a member of our congregation who is moving forward in his quest to become a Unitarian Universalist minister. On behalf of First Parish, the Standing Committee voted to sponsor Mark for entry into Unitarian Universalist ministry. Beginning this summer, Mark will be working in a one-year hospital chaplaincy program in Kansas City.

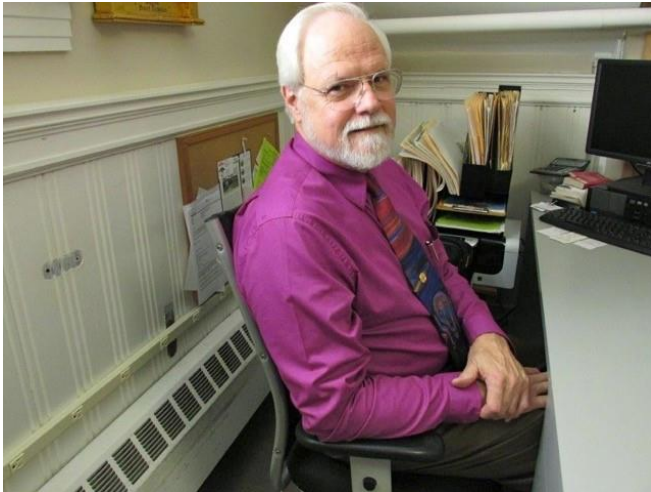
The Caring Connection

Small Group Ministry Program

Small Group Ministry Program

Starts October 2015

What is SGM? Small Group Ministry groups meet during a term of four months with a trained facilitator. Small Group Ministry provides an opportunity to listen to each other, to bear witness to one another's stories and experiences. Groups of eight to ten members and friends of First Parish consider topics of meaning and purpose in a way that supports connection and community. Newcomers and longer-term members find it a good way to get to know a few people better, particularly helpful in a large congregation.

Group Meetings: Groups usually meet twice a month for two hours *with a trained facilitator*, although some groups meet monthly. Participants *make a commitment* to attend meetings for four months at a time, a SGM term, for a total of four to eight meetings. Groups meet at First Parish or in individual homes. Participants agree to a covenant or guidelines on how they will be together. Hopefully, enough facilitators will volunteer so that there will be groups that meet on many days of the week and times of day.

Topics: At the core of each meeting is a topic or activity that serves as a springboard for reflection on deeper issues of who we are and what gives our lives meaning. Topics cover a range of spiritual and experiential themes—such as forgiveness, creativity, mentors, conscious consuming, gratitude, and doubt.

Format: Groups meet with the goal of developing community and promoting spiritual and personal growth. The format usually includes lighting a chalice, opening words, focused check-in, a reading that focuses on the topic, questions that elicit individual sharing from your experience, a brief sharing of likes and wishes for the session, and a closing reading.

Signing Up: There will be a three-week sign-up period before each four month SGM term. Sign-up sheets will be available at coffee hour as well as email sign-up. Specific information will become available at terms approach.

SGM Terms:

Fall Term: mid-October to mid-January (holiday schedules determined by group)

Spring Term: mid-February through May

Summer Term (if there is interest): mid-June to mid-August

UUSC-UUA Nepal Relief Collection Update

The plate collection on May 10 was given to the UUSC-UUA's Nepal Relief fund, on the recommendation of the Social Action Community Council. In the end, we collected \$6,776 for this fund. This money will go directly to support Chetana and Tewa (Philanthropy for Equitable Justice and Peace), a Nepali nongovernmental organization that is distributing relief kits, setting up a temporary classroom, and helping mothers in labor and pregnant women around Nepal. In addition to this donation, the SAC Council gave a \$2500 grant to the International Medical Corps, an organization recommended by a parishioner that is also providing grassroots relief to earthquake victims in Nepal.

Earth Day (April 20), including the Rain Barrel program, we raised \$563 for the UUSC's Blue Bucket Campaign! That will translate to access to drinking water for six families in the Kakamega Region of Kenya.
