

## **MUUsings**

This fall is full of special events for the First Parish music ministry. We took off like a rocket in September with the festivities surrounding the dedication of our new organ. It was wonderful to be able to celebrate this milestone for our congregation and our music ministry together. The celebration will continue when we cohost "Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza," a program for aspiring young organists, on October 22.



In October, we will welcome two extraordinary musical guests. Singer/songwriter and activist <u>Holly Near will perform</u> in our Sanctuary on Sunday, October 9. Even if you don't know the name Holly Near, I'll bet you know her songs. "We Are a Gentle Angry People" and "I Am Willing" are two of her classics that we regularly sing in worship. This concert is sponsored by the Diversity Committee and open to the public. There has been a lot of buzz about it already. See the article later in this newsletter for ticket information. It will be a great evening, and such an honor to host her in our Sanctuary.

At the end of the month, we will be visited by one of the brightest stars in the UU musical constellation, Rev. Jason Shelton. You already know Jason's music from hymns such as "The Fire of Commitment," "Standing on the Side of Love," and his beautiful arrangement of "Blue Boat Home." Many of his anthems are in our choir's repertoire, and we've performed two of his larger works, "Sources" in 2010 and "Suite Progress" in 2014.

## **Religious Exploration**

Children are bursting with questions. As a parent, I delight in the ways that my daughter meets the world around her with curiosity and joy. A child is an explorer, at once playing and discovering. Young minds are constantly taking in new information and seeking to make sense of the world.

Some of my daughter's most tender questions come at bedtime right before I turn out the light. Usually I am tired and ready to relax with my spouse. I remind myself to listen to the question behind the question and recognize that she does not need "the answer" but the ability to keep her heart open to whatever she is trying to make sense of at the moment.

With the pace of modern living, it is important to make room for great questions. As Rilke so beautifully articulates in his Letter to a Young Poet: "Be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves."

How do we learn to love the questions? By stopping the endless distraction of television, the Internet, and music—to sit in silence, open to the mystery.



Consider keeping an "I wonder" scrapbook or journal to capture both questions and insights. Do not answer the questions of children and youth but encourage them to wonder, dig deeper or explore together. Share great questions with your children, loved ones, and friends.

## **New Standing Committee Goals**

In a shift from previous years, the Standing Committee is formulating biennial goals to help direct us until 2018. This serves the dual purpose of forcing us to look further ahead for our congregation and to provide us with direction through the summer, rather than having a lull between the spring evaluation and the fall goal setting each year. At our September meeting, we worked in three small groups to form specific goals under the broad subjects identified at our August meeting: leadership, governance, and supporting social justice. We will continue to refine these goals in October.


## **Black Lives Matter Banner Update**
