

is what inspired the Civil Rights movement, and now the Women's March on Washington and our local Boston Women's March for America.



Those in the fifth grade and older helped to make bright yellow scarves for the marchers. The fleece scarves not only will help keep people warm but connect them with the "Standing on the Side of Love" campaign of our wider Unitarian Universalist Association. (Also, they help you find each other in the crowd.) The rest of the children set to work creating signs proclaiming our Unitarian Universalist values: "All People Are Created Equal," "Celebrate Diversity," "Love Will Guide Us."


"Sandwich Generation: Caring for Aging Parents and Children" Sunday, February 5, 11:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m., Brooks Room




