



A Message from Amy

There are some Christmas memories that we carry in our hearts. One of those treasured times in my life was Christmas Eve 2008. As a parish minister, it seemed like a funny turn of events to be expecting a baby in December. However, I was delighted to be able to snuggle in at home and ask a good colleague, Rev. Lark d'Helen, to offer our Candlelight Service. Once our daughter was born on December 9 and, thankfully we were both healthy, Lark invited our family to make an appearance in the service. In case any of us did not feel up to it, this plan was strictly confidential.



On Christmas Eve, we dressed in holiday clothes and bundled our newborn baby in a fluffy blanket. We drove over to Channing Memorial Church while the service was in progress and quietly entered through a side door. Once the Sanctuary was glowing with candlelight and the congregation began singing "Silent Night," Lark opened the door and we appeared on the chancel. We made our way down the aisle while everyone sang, "Holy infant so tender and mild, sleep in heavenly peace . . ." Looking into the



faces of the congregation that I served there were tears of joy and amazement. With my baby daughter in my arms and Peter at my side, I sat in a rocking chair on the chancel for the remainder of the service. It was a sacred moment filled with love and hope and peace—all the promises of Christmas.

MUUsings



William Grant Still (1895-1978) earned the designation "Dean of African American Composers" for his many musical accomplishments and "firsts"—first person of color to conduct a major American symphony orchestra, first black composer to have an opera performed by a major American opera company, and first major work performed by a leading American symphony orchestra. The list goes on.

Born in Mississippi and raised in Little Rock, Arkansas, he went on to study at Oberlin, to perform and compose in New York

during the Harlem Renaissance, and to write for radio and film in Los Angeles. Two world wars, the communist scare of the fifties, and the Civil Rights movement both shaped and scarred him. With his wife and collaborator, Verna Arvey, a daughter of Russian Jewish immigrants, Still raised a biracial family in the 1950's and 1960's. The couple's multicultural perspective was progressive for their time. They recognized the worth and dignity of all people, regardless of race or ethnicity.

In 1967, exactly 50 years ago, Still published *Christmas in the Western World*, an utterly charming piece for chorus, piano, and string orchestra. Influenced by his wife's lifelong interest in the "music of the Americas" (long before the dominant population of the United States had become aware of "other" Americas, as they are now), Still arranged this set of nine carols representing South, Central, and North American cultures. He composed a tenth, original song in the style of a rhythmic African-American spiritual. Arvey supplied translations of the Spanish texts, and wrote a narrative that gives context to the carols. Together, they tell the Christmas story in voices of cultures from the Americas, as interpreted by a mid-century African-American composer.

The First Parish Choir and Festival Orchestra, with Eric Huenneke at the piano, will offer *Christmas in the Western World* during our worship on Sunday, December 3. Coincidentally, this day is the 39th anniversary of William Grant Still's death. When I relayed this information to the composer's daughter, Judith Anne Still, she responded, "I am glad that you will do the piece on his last day—I think God is in that timing. My Father was in dark days by the time he died, and there was no funeral."



On December 3, the first Sunday in the season of Advent, may our worship celebrate the season, the Christmas story, and the life of this remarkable American composer.

Standing Committee News

Next Meeting: Sunday, December 10, 6:00 p.m., Emerson Room

Meeting Summary

On November 12, the Standing Committee met in the Emerson Room to hear regular reports, to examine the Staff Compensation Report, and to provide feedback to the Chair. We reviewed our current progress on the Year for Reflection and Visioning and our goals. In December, we will reconsider the status of our Black Lives Matter banner and learn about the upcoming Beloved Conversations curriculum. Minutes from our meetings are regularly posted on the website.



Nominating Committee

The Standing Committee unanimously approved Jennifer Izzo to the Nominating Committee to fill a vacancy. She joins Bruce Blumberg, Jan Goddard-Taylor, Doug Hardy, Eric Moore, Mark Russell Prior, and Alane Wallis. The Nominating Committee is responsible for putting forth candidates for the Standing Committee and Church Officers each year at Annual Meeting.

Staff Compensation Report

Twice a year, the Standing Committee reviews the actual compensation and benefits of each staff member and compares it to the guidelines recommended by the UUA. This regular practice is scheduled to ensure our awareness of the quality of our staff compensation and to help to guide us when considering staff raises and staff bonuses. From the report, it appears that increasing staff salaries will likely be a goal for next year's budget.

Year for Reflection and Visioning

Throughout the 2017-18 church year, First Parish will take time to reflect on the present and envision its future. This is the first in what will be a



once-every-five-year reassessment of where our community is and where we want to go. In November, several small groups convened to address the question about the focus of the upcoming congregational conversations and survey. A rough schedule was outlined, with conversations occurring in January and a survey early in February. The initiative will culminate in a congregational visioning summit the weekend of

March 10. Please watch FPAnnounce, the *Sunday News*, and the website for more opportunities to shape our future together.
