

January14 – Exile and Community: The Life of Carola Domar

A film on the life of a Holocaust survivor and longtime Concord resident Carola Domar. She escaped Nazi Germany in her teens and came to Concord, where she built a new life within the unique neighborhood of Conantum. In this documentary film, she and her daughter tell the story of her persistent search for community. Domar's story is all the more remarkable for the spirit of forgiveness with which she ultimately came to terms with her past and reconnected with her homeland. Her story of exile and community has particular relevance in the context of current mass migration. Film screening will be followed by discussion with film producer Susan Rieder and Carola's daughter, Alice.



The film, which runs 60 minutes, was produced and directed by Susan Orleans Rieder and sponsored by CCTV. It was partially funded by the Concord Cultural Council.

January 28 – Is Walden Okay?

A 2001 U.S. Geological Survey collected and organized a huge amount of data about the chemistry of Walden Pond between the years 1995-1999 (inclusive). Among the data were details on the annual variation in two elements, phosphorous and dissolved oxygen. The interaction of these two elements is the root cause of modern toxic algae blooms, such as those that have occurred on White Pond.



This talk will demonstrate a simple dynamic model that ties together the data on these elements and illustrates the level of the current threats to

the well-being of Walden Pond. The talk will also demonstrate that when the modern high levels of phosphorous are removed, the model reveals the probable pattern of the pond's function in earlier times. The surprising finding is that even in the late autumn of 1846, when Thoreau lived beside it, Walden Pond at its deepest points probably ran out of oxygen.

John M. (Jack) Nevison is president of New Leaf Project Management and lives within a half-mile of Walden Pond. He is the author of six books and numerous articles on computing and management. His first simulation model, about a watershed ecosystem, was published in 1974.

Luterano is a Spanish-speaking Lutheran congregation led by Rev. Ángel Marrero, who is Zach's husband.



MUUsings

Yonder come day, day is a breakin' Sun is a risin' in my soul.

These words, greeting the dawn of a new year, are sung on Watch Night, a New Year's Eve religious tradition in some African-American communities. This tradition may have roots in the fifteenth-century with the Moravian Church, in what is now the Czech Republic. For those ancient people of faith, Watch Night was a ritual of repentance and renewal, reminiscent of Rosh Hashanah in the Jewish tradition.



Eighteenth-century Moravian missionaries spread Watch Night to the Methodist church; and after a schism over racial discrimination, to the African Methodist Episcopal denomination, founded by freed slaves in Philadelphia. The tradition of Watch Night continued through the nineteenth-century in African-American communities, both free and enslaved. Among slave communities in the south, Watch Night had a particularly somber meaning: customarily, white property owners paid debts and redistributed property on January 1. For enslaved families, this presented the agonizing possibility of separation from spouses and children on the first day of the New Year.

However, the tone of Watch Night was transformed on the eve of January 1, 1863, when Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation went into effect. That evening, faithful people of African descent gathered to pray through the night between bondage and freedom. *Yonder Come Day,* a traditional spiritual of the enslaved was chanted while the congregation waited for day to break on the New Year and freedom. The chant has been preserved in what is thought to be an authentic version by the Gullah culture of the Georgia Sea Islands.

This January our choir will sing a favorite arrangement, based on this chant, by UU composer Clif Hardin. It is a delightful arrangement that bears little resemblance to the version preserved in the Georgia Sea Islands. Musicologists and composers, most of them white, have transcribed and transformed the song—bringing it to a wider audience, but also pulling it away from its roots. This is part of the "folk process," but when seen through the lens of white supremacy, it gives me pause. What are the assumptions that we have made by changing this chant? How can we sing it and still honor its origin? These are the kinds of questions that arise when we start to see whiteness—complex layers that merit further discernment and discussion.

May the day that is breaking bring us better understanding.

Meeting Summary

On December 10, the Standing Committee met in the Emerson Room. In additional to our regular business, we



heard reports from the Jericho Road Project, and Beloved Conversations and Race Conversations. Next month, we will discuss Howard's request for sabbatical, update our sabbatical policy, and hear about the new direction of our Denominational Affairs Committee. Minutes from our meetings are regularly posted on the website <u>here</u>.

Jericho Road Project Update

In August, JRP announced that they were shuttering operations and considering their options for the future. Over the past few months, many concerned people, primarily First Parish members, have discussed what the future of this 501c3 ought to be. Eric Van Loon and Halley McIlwain reported that JRP has decided to remain an independent nonprofit, with at least eight congregants agreeing to serve on the board. The focus of JRP will be to help bridge relationships between the members and friends of First Parish in Concord and the staff and volunteers at Lowell-area nonprofits. We are excited that this cooperation will provide another way to identify concrete actions for First Parishioners to "go out into the world."

Black Lives Matter Banner

At our meeting, Margie King Saphier and C.C. King reviewed the many activities of the Race Conversations Group over the past six months and outlined initiatives for this spring. We discussed the importance and timeliness of standing for racial justice. The Standing Committee unanimously voted to continue to hang the Black Lives Matter banner through Annual Meeting. However, it was also recognized that checking in every six months is a worthwhile exercise.



The banner is a temporary structure and will eventually come down, hopefully for a good reason.

Year for Reflection and Visioning



Visioning Throughout the 2017-18 church year, First Parish will take time to reflect on the present and envision its future. This is the first in what will be a once-every-five-year reassessment of where our community is and where we want to go. 




