February 4 - "Meet Rev. Rosemary Bray McNatt"

Rev. Rosemary Bray McNatt is president of Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, California and a graduate of Yale University and Drew Theological Seminary. She is a widely acknowledged editor, as well as the author of six books. Her years of service to the UUA in the realms of education and

The ongoing controversy over Concord's proposal to increase water treatment capacity at Acton's Nagog Pond may be a harbinger of the future. In this Forum, Acton resident and geoscientist Dr. Kim Kastens will share her view of the Nagog Pond situation and lead a discussion of what lessons we can learn about water in a time of scarcity.

Year for Reflection and Visioning Survey Says...

Members of the Standing Committee are so grateful to everyone who took the time to participate in the January Listening Sessions, where we collected valuable information to help us write a survey and set goals for First Parish for the next five years. It's still not too late to share your ideas. Feel free to speak with or send any thoughts to any member of the Standing Committee, listed below.



What's Next?

During the month of February, we ask you to complete a survey, based on what we heard during January's Listening Sessions. The survey asks you to evaluate aspects of First Parish, set priorities, and help us identify what needs attention during the next five years. All of this work is part of our *Year for Reflection and Visioning*, a new practice the Standing Committee will initiate every five years, to ensure church leaders are regularly consulting members of our congregation.

This year's survey also includes questions related to the 7.5% of annual pledges our



congregation currently sets aside for Social Action grants. A vote is scheduled at the June 2018 Annual Meeting on whether to reaffirm, revoke, or revise this practice. The Standing Committee will make a recommendation for the vote based on the sentiments you express in this survey.

Keep your eyes open. When the survey becomes available, early in February, links will be publicized in the yellow *Sunday News* insert, through the FP Announce email list, and on the home page of the First Parish website.

What's after the Survey?

The third and final part of this *Year for Reflection and Visioning* is the all-congregation retreat March 10, 2018. **Please mark your calendars now.** That's when we everything we have learned and begin mapping out goals for First Parish.

MUUsings


In another life (more years ago than I care to count) I served as music director for the Brooks School in North Andover, Massachusetts. During my four years there, I had the pleasure of working closely with Rob Humphreville, a wonderfully talented and facile pianist and organist, who arrived at the school the same year I did. He has remained on staff there ever since.

I appreciated Rob's musical skills as well as his wry sense of humor, which came out in some delightful ways:

Each Wednesday morning, the entire student body gathered in the school chapel for our weekly chapel service, a combination of an ecumenical religious service and school meeting. The "Chapel Choir," which was one of the groups I directed, usually sang these services and Rob would be there to play the organ. At the conclusion of the service/meeting there would always be announcements by various faculty and students. One Wednesday, one of the sopranos in the choir went to the microphone to announce that she had lost her music for "Somewhere over the Rainbow," and that if anyone found it,

they could return it to her. The meeting concluded soon after and the student body filed out in their usual noisy fashion as Rob played his postlude. As I sat and listened (some habits persist!), I realized that what he was playing was an ingenious, improvised fugue on "Somewhere over the Rainbow." I wanted to stop everyone and draw their attention to this brilliant musical feat, but I decided I would just listen and enjoy the joke myself.

Rob Humphreville's formidable improvisational skills will be on display in our Sanctuary on Saturday night, February 24, at 7:30 p.m. when he accompanies the silent classic "The Cameraman," starring Buster Keaton and Marceline Day. Ever since we realized we could install the new organ console downstairs and that it would be able to move, I have dreamed of having a silent movie night in our Sanctuary. That dream will be realized on February 24! I invite you to come out and enjoy the show and hear our wonderful new organ in a completely different context. This event is suitable for all ages



If you have never seen a silent movie with live accompaniment, this is an experience you can't miss. Hope to see you there!

Seeking Sanctuary

This past Monday I had the opportunity to visit a woman who is seeking sanctuary in the Bedford church with our First Parish in Concord member Tony Rodriguez, who, along with the Immigration Justice Task Force, has been spearheading our Sanctuary Two status. We sat together for an hour while she shared her story with me, a story that I could not comprehend as an American—a vulnerable story of hurt, heartbreak, tears, and resilience. This woman, whom I will not name in this article for her privacy though I will call her Sonia, is a true testament to what it takes to raise and support a family against all odds.



And as I reflected on Sonia's story, I thought about the lives that we live here in the United States. Granted, while our government is unstable at best, working people can expect to make a minimum of \$8/hour. Yes, yes I know this is a terribly broken system. Sonia told me in her home country a person can expect to make \$7 per day. I was shocked. On seven dollars a day, when a sparse cut of meat may cost \$4, how can one expect to support a family? Can you even imagine making \$7 per day? If you were forced to live on \$7 per day what would you choose to give up?

I think about grocery shopping. While I treat myself from time to time, I normally buy the most inexpensive groceries I can on my limited budget. One day I had to purchase the more expensive milk as the WIC*-approved milk was all expiring soon. I could not believe the difference in taste (and nutritional value)! I found out then that the WIC-approved milk was merely opaque water. I now try to buy the more expensive milk, but wonder if I were making \$7 per day, what groceries I would choose to survive on?

People come to this country in order to make the money their family needs to survive, just survive. First Parish in Concord has voted to become a Level Two Sanctuary Congregation, which means that we are ready and willing to provide immediate and necessary support to a Level One Sanctuary Congregation. And Tony told me that you are turning out in droves. Once again your generosity and love of your fellow humans shines in the life of Sonia and the work you are doing with First Parish in Bedford. When I asked Sonia what we could do to support her, her single answer was, "Pray for me; please ask your congregation to pray for me."

So, my friends, I invite you to join me wherever you are each day for just a few minutes to pray for peace, well-being, and justice for our friend Sonia.




Meeting Summary

On January 7, the Standing Committee met in the Emerson Room. In addition to our regular business, Rev. Jim Sherblom presented on behalf of the Denominational Affairs Committee. Next month we will discuss our Standing Committee operations policy. Minutes from our meetings are regularly posted on the SC website page.

Denominational Affairs Update

Rev. Jim Sherblom attended our meeting and discussed some of the current initiatives in the denomination, as well as our desire to reinforce some of the strong ties that exist between members of our congregation and the UUA. He encouraged lay leaders to read <u>Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity and Power in Ministry,</u> by Mitra Rahnema. Jim expressed gratitude for the January share-the-plate initiative in support of Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism, and encouraged us to budget our fair share of UUA dues, especially during this time of radical changes in leadership and work to dismantle institutional white supremacy.



Jericho Road

We acknowledged the new beginnings of the Jericho Road Project (presented by Eric Van Loon at our December meeting) endorsing an official statement:

"The Standing Committee of First Parish in Concord wishes to extend our encouragement and support to your entire Jericho Road team for your efforts to rebuild and reinvent your mission. We greatly appreciate the work you have done, and look forward to working alongside you in making this a better world."

Good luck to the board as they relaunch this organization that builds relationships between people of Lowell and our local community.

Sabbatical

The Standing Committee voted to adopt a revised Sabbatical Policy that is more simplified than our previous policy. Our policy remains consistent with the recommendations advised by the UU Minsters' Association. In addition, we formally approved Howard's request for sabbatical from December 2018-February 2019.

IRA's and Qualified Charitable Distributions Even better in 2018!

Are you over 70½ and worried you won't be able to deduct your gifts to First Parish under the new tax law? Not to worry. Under the new federal tax law, many IRA owners who are 70½ or older can save money on their taxes by making a "qualified charitable distribution" (QCD) from their IRA directly to First Parish (or other qualified public charity). QCDs are free of income tax, up to a maximum of \$100,000, and count toward satisfying the donor's minimum IRA distributions required after age 70½.

While this technique is not new, it is even more attractive in 2018 in light of the increase in the standard deduction and limitation of the deduction for state taxes. Last year, the standard deduction for a couple over 65 was \$15,200: \$12,700 plus \$1,250 additional per person over 65. The standard deduction for a couple over 65 has now increased to \$26,500: \$24,000 for married couples filing jointly, plus \$1,250 per person over 65. At the same time, the deduction for itemizing state taxes – income and property – is now capped at \$10,000. Therefore, in 2018, an over 65 couple would need to have more



than \$16,500 of deductions, primarily charitable contributions and mortgage interest, to exceed their \$26,500 standard deduction. Many donors who have itemized their deductions in the past will no longer do so and will not save any additional taxes for their charitable contributions. But a qualified charitable distribution from the donor's IRA allows the donor to effectively keep the deduction, by removing the donated IRA funds from the donor's taxable income. And, as before, it effectively reduces your Massachusetts income by that amount as well.

Note that the requirements are specific. The company that maintains the IRA must transfer the gift directly to the qualified organization. IRA owners should not withdraw funds and then contribute them to charity separately. Amounts withdrawn in that way will be taxable to the donor. Consult with your financial advisor or IRA custodian to assure you satisfy the requirements.






World Day of Prayer
