

The continued existence of the Forum itself depends on volunteers stepping forward to be part of the Forum team. Come share your thoughts and hear about what's happening.


October 14 - Senior Cohousing - A Community Approach to Aging in Place

Meals Preparation Coordinator Needed

Train with Vivienne Next Cook Day, Friday, December 7

Our Pastoral Care Council needs a Meals Preparation Coordinator, as Vivienne Aldrich, who has done a wonderful job streamlining the position, will be stepping down in December (next Cook Day scheduled in the spring at coordinator's convenience). The meals serve parishioners in times of transition: bereavement, illness, injury, and emotional crisis. Meals are prepared two to three times a year by a team of volunteers, and are stored in our freezer.

The coordinator must take a "Safe Serve Training for Kitchen Managers" training, which can be done online, and is paid for by Pastoral Care. Vivienne and previous Meals Preparation Coordinators provide helpful information to make it easy to step into this position, including recipes and shopping lists. Other volunteers do the shopping, communication, and cooking for our Cook Days.

"... Whenever you find tears in your eyes, especially unexpected tears, it is well to pay the closest attention. They are not only telling you something about the secret of who you are, but more often than not God is speaking to you through them of the mystery of where you have come from and is summoning you to where, if your soul is to be saved, you should go to next."

—Frederick Buechner Whistling in the Dark

This is one of my favorite passages, written by writer and theologian Frederick Buechner.* It came to mind recently as I was describing John Kramer's recent cantata, *The Immigrant*



Experience, to a choir member. As I detailed the texts that Kramer drew on, from "the New Colossus" that is quoted on the base of the Statue of Liberty to the words of American leaders describing what it means to be "a nation of immigrants," to Kramer's vivid musical portrayal of the monotonous and frightening journey north to the Mexican border, I suddenly couldn't speak. The lump rose in my throat and unexpected tears gathered in my eyes.

I feel such urgency around the issue of immigration in our country right now. Like many of you, I am horrified at our inhumane treatment of people at our borders and unsettled by echoes of historical inhumanities to "the other." Kramer's cantata, which I had the opportunity to perform last spring, provided a musical affirmation of what I believe to be our calling and vision as a "nation of immigrants." It is this deep affirmation that brought on my tears—and that calls me to share this music once again.

We are bringing musicians together here at First Parish to perform *The Immigrant Experience* in a concert on Sunday, November 18, at 7:00 p.m. More than a month away, I know, but save the date! Singers from our choir, and from choirs of congregations supporting the Level 1 Sanctuary at First Parish in Bedford, will join the performance. Concert proceeds will support the cause of immigration justice.

More to come next month. Now, I leave you with the words of poet Emma Lazarus:

"Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free.
... Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me: I lift my lamp beside the golden door."

Year of Reflection and Visioning Follow-Up

The Standing Committee has begun the process of developing a plan to act on the input from First Parish members that was gathered last year in listening sessions, a survey, and at our

congregation-wide springtime retreat. The Standing Committee itself held a retreat September 15 to start the process of generating goals to bring about change based on that input. We worked with the three themes that were identified last spring: building connected community, changing who we are, and reaching outward. We discussed transformational change, defined as a significant, sustainable, and long-lasting change. Our overall intent is to move First Parish gently but firmly into new directions that will sustain us for many years to come. More details to follow.

Ministering to the Community



On November 25, during the 10:00 a.m. Sunday service, I will be honored with ordination by First Parish in Concord. My path to ministry has been circuitous and root-riddled. And now we are here. Although the act of ordination makes no distinction, it is important, I think, to differentiate community ministry from parish ministry. Quite simply, a community minister serves the wider community, either independently or through a community agency. In my case, I serve Door and Kewaunee Counties in Wisconsin as a hospice chaplain working for a not-for-profit hospice agency. As we serve the same population, I have covenanted to be in affiliation with the UU Fellowship of Door County.

Although I practice the same ministerial arts as a parish minister, my focus is on pastoral care for people who are dying and their families, regardless of their belief system. My UU faith gets me to the door. When I enter, I am serving my clients in the context of their own sense of being.

Next month, I will write a bit more about my path to ordination.






