




the event's aftermath—all important for a deeper understanding of police shootings.

Prepare and Train, December 7

This is a very important part of the pastoral care program at First Parish. The Pastoral Care needs a Daytime Meals Preparation Coordinator, as Vivienne Aldrich will be retiring. The meals serve

parishioners in times of transition: death, illness, divorce and times of emotional crisis. The meals are kept in the church's freezer and are prepared two to three times a year. Meals are delivered by lay ministers or can be requested by parishioners, if needed.

The coordinator must take a "Safe Serve Training for Kitchen Managers" course, which can be done by computer and is paid for by Pastoral Care. A folder of recipes for meals is available; and shopping, communication, and cooking are provided by church volunteers.

Music Ministry

MUUsings

Expressing gratitude is a year-round spiritual practice. But in November the United States Thanksgiving holiday and the story of the Pilgrims' first harvest meal with the Wampanoag people makes gratitude central. I am grateful to serve in a religious community where we take the time to pause and observe Thanksgiving while the rest of the world rushes toward the December holidays.

This month, the music at First Parish is brimming with gratitude for the many ways in which we are blessed.

"I ask all blessings,
I ask them with reverence,
Of my mother the earth,
Of the sky, moon, and sun my father....

First Parish Choir will sing this anonymous Navaho prayer on a Sunday when we consider indigenous spiritual traditions that existed before Christian settlers arrived on this continent. While the people who shared that first harvest feast with the Pilgrims were Wampanoag, rather than Navajo, they shared a deep reverence for Mother Earth. As a descendent of some of those early Puritans, I am not often called to ponder the spirituality of those who greeted my ancestors. I am grateful the opportunity to do that this month.

On Thanksgiving Sunday, the combined First Parish Choirs will join in the spirited old gospel hymn *Sow it on the Mountain*. The text, adapted from the original, reminds us that if we reach out in compassion, generosity, and friendship "we're gonna reap just what we sow." And Lui Collins' beautiful anthem "Blessed" is a simple prayer of thanks for the blessings of earth and music: "Hallelujah, O blessed are we this day."

And then there's *The Immigrant Experience* that we will perform in a concert on November 18 with singers from several UU Congregations. This work conveys the complexity of our immigration history. It considers the experience of those who came to this country by choice or to escape oppression as well as those indigenous people who were "torn away from their lands to make room for others." It reminds us movingly of the aspirations and errors of our founders. The work is a call to live up to those aspirations even as we recognize the ways in which we have fallen short of realizing them.

I am grateful for words and music that allow us to express our gratitude, count our blessings, and renew our aspirations. And I look forward to sharing this music in November.

Ministering to the Community

A Long and Winding Road

I believe my path to ministry began on September 11, 2001. I could not get past the feeling that all we worked for in college to end the Vietnam war had been forgotten, and that this event will send us back into a generational war. With this on my mind, the Men's Solo Retreat of 2003 began as very intentional for me. I followed a formula for quests that led me to a very explicit call to ministry. The following fall I entered seminary.

My time at Andover-Newton was mixed. I was working full-time and studying part-time. My intention to study full time in my third year was derailed by the decision of the New England Subcommittee on Candidacy to deny me candidate status. Even though my process with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee was done, I finished my degree.

Over the next few years, after struggling to define myself as a lay community minister, I discovered that I needed some structure if this was going to be meaningful in any way. In 2015, I was accepted into the chaplain residency program at St. Luke's Hospital in Kansas City, Missouri. At the same time I applied for reinstatement with the Ministerial Fellowship Committee. With the sponsorship of First Parish in Concord, my application was granted and I was on my way to preliminary fellowship. The time I spent in Kansas City, with the help of members of both All Souls UU Church and Shawnee Mission UU Church, was fruitful in preparing me for my MFC interview. In December 2017, I met with the committee and was granted conditional preliminary fellowship. I met the conditions, and in April 2018 I was welcomed into fellowship.

Throughout this journey, the good folks at First Parish in Concord have offered me support and love. And now, you who walked with me such a long way on this path will ordain me into ministry. I am most blessed and humbled by the love I receive from you in this place.





Free Feminist Film Series




Helper elves, we need you! First Parish children spend the afternoon creating beautiful handmade gifts for the holidays. Be a part of our joyful community of crafty helper elves!

Steps to Send Entry

- 1. Plan ahead; then add a "fudge factor"—extra time for committee review and for Editor's questions. We recommend a week. We need you to adhere to deadlines.
- 2. How much lead time does the Editor need? Which Editor?
 - a. Weekly email FP Weekly; send to Sarah Burns by Friday noon
 - b. **Sunday** insert *Sunday News*; maximum three times for one event; send to Sarah by Wednesday noon
 - c. **Monthly** newsletter *Meeting House News (MHN)*; send to Wendy by the deadline noted in the first two pages of your last *MHN* or below.
- 3. Write draft, send for review, rewrite, and send final form **as an attachment** to the Editor before deadline. We cannot use copy when sent within an email, due to the many added characters and additional editing required.
