

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

# **Music Ministry**

#### **MUUsings**

On Friday, November 2, after the massacre at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, folks from First Parish and other faith communities in Concord gathered for a candlelight vigil on the steps outside Kerem Shalom. We greeted worshippers as they arrived for the Shabbat service with light and with song. We sang, *"Hineh ma tov umah na yim"* (How good and pleasant it is when people dwell together in unity), "Courage, my friend, you do not walk alone . . . ", "We are a gentle angry people and we are singing for our lives . . . ", "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine," and many others. The singing, unrehearsed, all-inclusive, imperfect and heartfelt, brought strangers together and gave us



strength in that communal act of solidarity, sadness, and hope. And it expressed to the worshippers at Kerem Shalom the depth of our support and our love as no other gesture could.

I am literally a child of the 1960's. The backdrop for the first decade of my life was the political turmoil of that period and the music of the civil rights and Vietnam protests. The voices I heard as a very young musician were those of the sixties folk revival: Peter, Paul, and Mary, Pete Seeger, Joan Baez. From a very early age, I have understood the power of song to unite people in common cause; to express our deepest fears and our greatest vision.

The songs that were sung at 1960's demonstrations and sit-ins came out of the black church, the labor movement and the American folk song repertoire. They were songs everyone could sing; songs everyone knew, or felt they knew—songs that could be adapted to the situation. My experience in this current new era of activism, at women's marches and at anti-white supremacy marches, has been that crowds are more apt to chant (and yell) than to sing. More than once, I've had people say to me, as we marched, "I wish we could sing." And my response is, "Then let's sing."

If this is something you have thought, or said, at a public witness or demonstration, please come to the January 5 "Song Leading for Justice" workshop led by Matt Meyer. It promises



to be an empowering, inspiring morning for all. We can all be song leaders. We don't need to look to others to make it happen.

#### **Tax Planning**

#### **IRAs and Qualified Charitable Distributions**

Are you over 70<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> and worried you won't be able to deduct your gifts to First Parish under the new tax law? Not to worry. Under the new federal tax law, many IRA owners who are 70<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> or older can save money on their taxes by making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from their IRA directly to First Parish (or other qualified public charity). QCDs are free of income tax, up to a maximum of \$100,000, and count toward satisfying the donor's minimum IRA distributions required after age 70<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>.

While this technique is not new, it is even more attractive in light of the increase in the standard deduction and limitation of the deduction for state taxes. Last year, the standard deduction for a couple over sixty-five was \$15,200: \$12,700 plus \$1,250 additional per person over sixty-five. The standard deduction for a couple over sixty-five has now increased to \$26,500: \$24,000 for married couples filing jointly, plus \$1,250 per person over sixty-five. At the same time, the deduction for itemizing state taxes income and property is now capped at \$10,000. Therefore, in 2018, an over sixty-five couple would need to have more than \$16,500 of deductions, primarily charitable contributions and mortgage interest, to exceed their \$26,500 standard deduction. Many donors who have itemized their deductions in the past will no longer do so and will not save any additional taxes for their charitable contributions. But a qualified charitable distribution from the donor's IRA allows the donor to effectively keep the deduction, by removing the donated IRA funds from the donor's taxable income. And, as before, it effectively reduces your Massachusetts income by that amount as well.

Note that the requirements are specific. The company that maintains the IRA must transfer the gift directly to the qualified organization. IRA owners should not withdraw funds and then contribute them to charity separately. Amounts withdrawn in that way will be taxable to the donor. Consult with your financial advisor or IRA custodian to assure you satisfy the requirements.



# **Other Cool Stuff**

#### **Concord Area Humanists**

#### Wednesday, January 9, 7:00 p.m., Parish Hall

Artificial Intelligence (AI) will inevitably surpass human intelligence, eventually evolving its own software "DNA." If AI doesn't care about people, it may destroy everything we value. But if we're careful how we build it, AI could deliver a vastly better world than the present

day. Self-aware or "conscious" Als may ask the universal human questions: What are we? Why are we here? What is the true nature of Reality?

  - c. **Monthly** newsletter *Meeting House News (MHN)*; send to Wendy by the deadline noted in the first two pages of your last *MHN* and on below.
- 3. Write draft, send for review, rewrite, and send final form **as an attachment** to the Editor before the deadline. We cannot use copy when sent within an email, due to the many added characters and additional editing required.
