Sunday Forum, October 20, 10:30 a.m. to Noon "Regaining Balance—The Evolution of the UUA"

Once one of America's most influential Protestant denominations, the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has imploded over the past 40 years, shrinking to 0.51% of the population. Why? Former AHA president Michael Werner ticks off the reasons, from a fuzzy obsession with pluralism to a disdain for the Humanist values that drove the UUA's rise to prominence in the first place. "Follow the money," Werner urges, as he analyzes one policy failure after another. Regaining Balance—The Evolution of the UUA is not an obituary for the UUA, but a prescription for recovery.
