Finding Common Ground Between Preservation and Performance Saturday, October 22, 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., Emerson Room Buildings in historic districts are subject to various regulations that often conflict with sustainability aspirations. Is the debate between preservation and performance inevitably a zero-sum game, in which the more you get of one the less you get of the other, or can we find winwin solutions? This first conversation will focus on windows—a key area of contention between the preservation camp and the performance camp—and will feature a panel of experts from the design, engineering, building, and preservation spheres. We will look at the architectural history of windows in New England, the effect of window choice on space heating and cooling, the architectural impact of modifying windows, and durability and embodied energy concerns. Panelists include Jean Carroon of Goody Glancy, Sally Zimmerman of Historic New England, and Mike Duclos of DEAP Energy Group LLC.
