Sunday Forum in the Sanctuary Sunday, January 28, 11:30 a.m.

"Is Walden Pond Okay?" Could a toxic algae bloom, such as those that have occurred in recent years at White Pond, happen at Walden Pond? A 2001 U.S. Geological Survey collected and organized a huge amount of data about the chemistry of Walden Pond in the years 1995-1999. Among the data were details on the annual variation in concentrations of two elements, phosphorous and dissolved oxygen. The interaction of these two elements is the root cause of modern toxic algae blooms. Jack Nevison will explain a simple dynamic model that ties together the data on these elements and illustrates the level of the current threats to the well-being of Walden Pond. Also shown will be why, when modern high levels of phosphorous are removed, the dynamic model reveals the probable pattern of the pond's functioning in earlier times. Jack is president of New Leaf Project Management and lives within a half-mile of Walden Pond.
