In this concert, Oriana presents beautiful but infrequently-performed choral works by several lesser-known composers. 16th-century Swiss composer Ludwig Senfl gives us a sacred motet and a lively mimetic piece that sounds like bells in a cathedral tower. The first half ends with three small-ensemble choruses by Boston's own Amy Beach. The program ends with Gerald Finzi's sensitive choral settings of seven poems of Robert Bridges (later England's Poet Laureate).
