October's Share the Plate Recipient: Mil Milagros

October's Share the Plate recipient is Mil Milagros—A Thousand Miracles. This organization partners with more than 800 indigenous Mayan mothers and teachers to serve more than 1,300 children each year in early childhood development, nutrition, health and hygiene, and education programs. Rates of chronic child malnutrition and stunting have decreased 50 percent in these communities. An average of 97 percent of the children supported by Mil Milagros complete the sixth grade. Please consider giving generously to October's Share the Plate program to help Mil Milagros expand its reach. There are more than 50 schools and 10,000 children on the waiting list.

"Protecting Transgender Rights: Yes on 3 Campaign" Today's Forum, October 28, 11:30 a.m., Sanctuary

Daniel Overton, cochair of Lexington High School's GSA, speaks about LGBTQIA+ issues in high school health classes, teacher trainings, and public meetings. He is an ordinary person who finds himself in the extraordinary position of having to defend his right to exist in public places.
