November's Share the Plate Recipient: Camino Verde

Camino Verde (Green Road) reclaims and protects threatened rainforest in the Peruvian Amazon by planting native trees—over 30,000 (400 species) so far—a concrete answer to climate change. Camino Verde also works with farmers to regenerate forests, and with indigenous communities to distill essential oils as sustainable products—a model others can emulate. CV also partners with a private corporation to plant 100 acres and manage 400 wild rain forest acres. Its Peruvian staff of 10 includes 4 women (2 university-educated).
