January's Share-the-Plate Recipient:

Meet City Mission – our January Share-the-Plate recipient. For 200 years, City Mission has focused on rooting out poverty in Boston neighborhoods, with a strategic focus on preventing family homelessness. City Mission's programs include homeless prevention programs, such as Lift Up, for low-income single mothers and the Emergency Needs Network for unemployed, elderly, and/or disabled Boston residents; coordinating donations to low income children and families, through Coat Boston and the Christmas Shop; and teaching program participants and Greater Boston high school students about the systemic causes of family homelessness and advocacy skills, and recruiting them to advocate with the state legislature for measures to prevent and ameliorate homelessness.

Susan received a Master's of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School and a Bachelor's of Science in Molecular Biology from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. She is a lifelong UU who grew up in the St. Louis area. She lives now in Cambridge, Mass., with her husband Brian and their son.
